

AGENDA <u>6:30-9:00</u> — Beginning half an hour early, this month's meet-

ing will be our first critique session. 15 members have signed up to bring at least one piece they have turned – either fully or partially – to be reviewed by a panel of 3 experts. There will be

no Show & Tell or demonstration sessions at this meeting.



THE meeting will be devoted to an extended *Show & Tell* session with formal critiques of each item by a panel of three art, craft, and turning experts. It is not necessary to bring a piece to attend the meeting and participate in the discussions – everyone should come, learn, and have a good time.

The panelists are **David Fry** (professional woodturner and MCW member), **Barbara Wolanin** (Curator for the Architect of the U.S. Capitol & art historian), and **Carolyn Romano** (professional potter and printmaker).

This is a chance to broaden our horizons and learn new things about how other people view our work and how we might approach turning differently. Problem pieces are welcome. We'll talk about everything from wood selection and design considerations to turning techniques and finishing. This program will be a unique opportunity to learn how to improve what we are doing in a positive and instructive environment.

Participants will bring one piece to have it reviewed. (A second piece can be put on a separate table for possible consideration, if time permits.)

Please bring your pieces at 6:15 PM and sign them in, as usual, with Richard Webster. To save time, please make your size measurements in advance. The panelists need to have time to gather their thoughts and present their evaluations. Hal Burdette will also need the extra time for photography.

Each participant should be prepared to say a few words about their piece. Comments and questions from the audience will be welcome after the panelists have made their remarks.

This program is very likely to be a fun time for all, in addition to being educational and instructive. Whether or not you bring a piece to be evaluated, please come to the January meeting and join in this learning opportunity.


As President for 2010, I plan to build on Phil's successful formula and focus my efforts to continue to:


- Serve and solicit guidance from the members



NEW TURNING TOOLS

MICHAEL BLAKE

UNIQUE BOWL GOUGES BY HANNESTOOL

N the Fall 2007 edition of *American Woodturner*, Alan Lacer wrote an article titled *What's New* that provided brief highlights of eleven new products presented at the AAW Symposium in Portland. The entry that caught my attention was about a new line of gouges by HannesTool.

These gouges were designed and developed by JoHannes Michelsen – known as *the man who turns hats*. The triangle-shaped handles and the simple elegance of the tools design caught and kept my attention. I logged on to the HannesTool website, but was disappointed at how few items were actually available at that time.

When confronted with a situation like this, I usually get ticked off and blow it off. But something told me not to give up on Michelsen and his elegant tools. So, I added the HannesTool website to my favorites list and, over the past 2 or so years, I have checked on the site every 2 or 3 months. I have to say, that the result was the same until late last year. I checked in sometime in November and was floored by the change I found.

Michelsen now has a completely redesigned website and offers a significant line of tools.

I discovered Hannes Tool had a booth at the AAW Symposium in Albuquerque last year and Michelsen demonstrated his gouges. Obviously not satisfied with less than the best, it has simply taken a year and a half to perfect his designs, find the right people, and dealing with the manufacturing process.

After surfing around the new site and speaking with Mr. Michelsen, I found out the reasoning behind his tools and why he believes they are unique and superior to others.

FIRST is the quality of the steel used for the blade of each gouge. With former turning student Doug Thompson signing on to cut the steel, Michelsen insisted on using CPM10V or A-11 steel, triple tempered to RC-62 hardness and cryogenically toughened between the first and second heat treatments.

SECOND, is the ergonomic, rounded-triangular handle and the mounting system. While the shape is the main "ergonomic" feature, the softness of the rubber also plays a part and helps dampen vibration. The shape and ease of grip improve control and reduce fatigue, making it easier to make better cuts. The core of each handle is an extruded aluminum tube, with ½" walls, and an inner diameter to accommodate the blades, insert tubes for smaller sizes, and #9 lead shot to absorb vibration.

THIRD is the unusual, but well reasoned, bevel grind used for the gouges. The rounded, convex shape of the grind, along with a fine point and a swept-back flute have 3 major advantages. \$\div\$

[1] Unlike the concave grind used on most gouges, this convex shape has no "heel" that might leave scrape marks. [2] The fine rounded tip allows for finer, tighter cuts. [3] The swept-back flute edges allow for more slicing cuts, less scraping, and virtually eliminate the chance of catches.

The vibration-absorption of the handle system is a feature Michelsen considers worth particular attention. As mentioned previously, the rubber "covering" contributes a good bit to the reduction of vibration. In addition, he glues a round wood block into each handle in place with the end of the tool blade and long enough to allow for adding the lead weights with enough room so they can move slightly. The end of the handle is sealed with a rubbber gasket knob, tightened with an Allen screw. This level of vibration reduction also helps reduce fatigue and can help increase the time spent turning.

Michelsen says he never intended to sell anything but his turnings, much less become a tool manufacturer. But after helping students at his woodturning school get the best tools available at the time, he began to think he could design a better bowl gouge. Helped along by Doug Thompson – who now does the steel "cutting" for HannesTool – Michelsen now offers a range of gouges for everything from roughing to fine detailing.

Michelsen considers the set screw method of securing blades in hollow handles a flawed concept. So he has been gluing his blades into his handles from the beginning.

When I spoke to him on December 30th, he had just received the final prototypes of a collet system for securing his blades. In the first photo shown here, the extruded aluminum tube has been threaded and four compression groves have been added. In the second photo, flat sections in the collet and the tube are shown. Michelsen was hoping a collet system would work with hand tightening alone, but soon found out that the use of wrenches was necessary to hold the blades in place securely.

Michelsen is now in the process of revising prices based on the collet system configuration. He intends to keep prices the same as for the "glued" version, with \$60 for the Small 18" and \$75 for the Large 22" as the base for other sizes.

An icon and living legend in the woodturning community over the past 30 years, David has become known as one of the premier creators of turned wooden vessel forms. He *invented* the technique of *blind turning* thin-walled hollow vessels through a small hole with bent tools. (His first article, titled *Hollow Turning*, appeared in the May/June 1979 issue of *Fine Woodworking* magazine.) His signature gouge grind is one of the current standards. He is a founder of the American Association of Woodturners (AAW). He was AAW's first President from 1986-1991 and its first Honorary Lifetime Member. He has written over 50 articles on woodturning and operates the Ellsworth School of Woodturning at his studio in Bucks County, Pennsylvania. His works are included in the permanent collections of 35 museums, including the Smithsonian American Art Museum, the Metropolitan Museum of Art in New York, the Philadelphia Museum of Art, the Victoria & Albert Museum in London, and the Mint Museum of Craft + Design in Charlotte, North Carolina, as well as countless national and international private collections, including the White House. He was recently honored in Washington, D.C. as a Fellow of the American Craft Council. For more, see ellsworthstudios.com.
