MARCH PROGRAM - CHUCK ENGSTROM SMALL GOBLETS & HOMEMADE TOOLS

CHUCK is the current president of Chesapeake Woodturners in Annapolis and is an experienced professional spindle turner (chandeliers and architectural work from 'modest' to seven feet tall) and interesting demonstrator. For fun, he now makes just about anything turning offers – bowls, boxes, platters, hollow forms, goblets, bottles stoppers, and all the rest.

At our March meeting, Chuck will turn a pair of small goblets – one with a natural edge and one with a "regular" edge – with a few simple tools. In a past demonstration, Patrick O'Brien began a goblet, but did not have time to complete it. And at his demo on jam chucks and jigs, Clif Poodry used goblets to show how to make and use the chucks and jigs. Chuck's demo will close the loop very well.

Goblets provide practice for a number of skills – parting, beading, and skew chisel work, reinforcing Mark Supik's demonstration last month.

Chuck makes some of his own tools from inexpensive, often easily available materials. He will not only demonstrate his tools, but will bring some HSS blanks for sale so you can make some of your own at home. He will also supply written instruction handouts.

He left a mini-lathe at the site, planning to bring another lathe and hoping to set up 2-3 stations and regular monthly sessions.

Mark Verna suggested setting up a wood scavenging and cutting program. He hopes for a weekend day (2/26 or 2/27) to cut some wood that he has already gathered and is willing to share. Several people showed interest and Bert will send an e-mail to the membership to recruit volunteers.

Gary Guenther introduced MCW-member, professional turner, and demonstrator for the evening, Mark Supik and his demonstration of spindle work using a Skew Chisel.









Sessions run from 8:30 AM to 5:00 PM. Students are provided with safety equipment, an individual lathe, and set of tools to use during the workshop. All project materials provided. Class size is limited to five. Cost is \$150 for the all day workshop, \$50 deposit required to hold your space, refundable up to one week prior to class. Class cost for all area AAW Chapter members is discounted 20% to \$120. Coffee and donuts are provided and lunch from a famous Baltimore delicatessen.

"WOOD HUNT" PROGRAM

MARK VERNA has launched our Wood Hunt Program by conducting the first and very successful event held at his home on Sunday, February 27th. Tim Aley, Tom Ankrum, Bert Bleckwenn, and Carl Powell showed up well equipped and took part in processing a variety of woods—walnut, cherry, box elder, apple, and peach. Mark and his wife had harvested an impressive selection of wood from their own neighborhood area before we arrived.

Mark had several saw buck arrangements set up to help make cutting the logs easy. One was a low jig with a ramp to easily roll the logs up to the cutting station. Another was a waist high buck for ripping through log chunks to get the optimum number of bowl blanks. An upright log with a "V"-cut served well in cutting up the various chunks. Mark provided AnchorSeal so we could seal the ends of the various bowl and other blanks.

Members came well equipped with chain saws and the necessary safety gear including ear protectors, eye shields and safety chaps. Tom Ankrum was definitely was the best equipped with the proper safety gear. Everyone was equipped with large-blade Husqvarna chain saws, except Bert, who showed up with a 50-year old 14" Homelite that did duty for final trimming and some ripping of smaller pieces and definitely took the prize for loudness. Mark had a band saw on hand for further preparation of bowl blanks and he also helped with chainsaw blade sharpening.

Mark has built a clever and easy-to-use custom *log lifter* for loading logs on to his pickup and has plans for a hoist as well. He continues to outfit himself with the tools and accessories for handling the logs. Mark also has an eagle-eye for scavenging. If needed, MCW will invest in additional aids to support this program.

We ended up processing more wood than we could all carry, but we walked away with 1-2 pieces of each variety and it was well worth the effort. Mark hopes to bring a few pieces to the next MCW meeting's Silent Auction so other members can enjoy the fruits of our labor.

Seven additional Members have signed up for future Wood Hunt events and others are encouraged to sign up. So watch for communications announcing future events. If you are interested in participating, please send an email to me at bableck@gmail.com and I will add you to the "Hunt Roster" for communications about future activities. Even if you do not have a chainsaw, you can join in. There are plenty of jobs such as helping move pieces, painting on the AnchorSeal, and cleaning up... anything you do to help will earn you as many turning blanks as you can carry.

Many thanks to Mark for spearheading this effort... yet another example of MCW Members helping support other Member's interests and needs!

PRESIDENT'S PERSPECTIVE

WARRIORS-IN-TRANSITION PROGRAM UPDATE

Instead of having to close down the Warrior Support Program, a number of significant changes have recently taken place that well may breathe new life into the program –

Chris Wright, manager of the Forest Glen Annex Woodshop, has assumed overall management responsibility for the entire Arts & Crafts Center at the Annex as well as his Wood Shop responsibilities.



- No further turning sessions are being conducted at the Annex because of getting the warriors to and from and in and out of the facility.
- A twice-monthly Warrior Turning Program has begun at the Art Therapy Department at the original Walter Reed Hospital main site on Georgia Avenue and is being supported by Chris Wright and the Arts & Craft Center along with assistance from MCW.
- Two of MCW's mini-lathes have been relocated to the Art Therapy Department classroom along with basic accessories and supplies. Because of space limitations, there are no plans to add more equipment.
- Being on location where the warriors are located, two full hours are being scheduled per session so a total of four warriors can turn pens using one hour sessions per warrior each on the two mini-lathes.
- The remaining equipment (Jet midi-lathe, sharpening station, extra turning tools, and supplies) have been moved from the Forest Glen Woodshop to the Woodworkers Club for our Skills Enhancement Program.
- Two turning sessions were conducted by Chris Wright and Bert Bleckwenn at the Art Therapy Department in February. Plans are taking shape to start involving the other volunteers, Elliot Schantz and Don Van Ryk, along with Jeff Bridges from the Chesapeake Woodturners, so MCW can support the twice monthly sessions which will likely be either the first and third Tuesday or Wednesday of each month.
- The continuation of the Arts & Craft Center facility is still in serious question, but discussions are underway of finding funding to either continue with the current facility or possibly relocating it at the Bethesda site where the new Walter Reed Hospital is being built.
- The current Art Therapy Department is expected to be relocated to Bethesda as part of the transition of

the current Walter Reed Hospital site with the new turning program also continuing at the new facility.

So, MCW will continue to provide a Warrior Support Program for our warriors for the foreseeable future, just scaled back and at a different facility. A key to our continued involvement, however, will be the continuation of the Arts & Craft Center as MCW is a volunteer to this organization and is allowed to support the warriors because of Chris Wright's involvement.

Many thanks to Don, Elliot, and Jeff for their continued support. In addition, I hope to transfer coordination of the program to Don Van Ryk, once the schedule is stabilized. We could still use 1-2 additional MCW volunteers to participate in supporting the program, so let me know if you are interested in volunteering for a two hour turning session once a month. They are a lot of fun and you get a chance to do something for our warriors they really enjoy and appreciate.

SKILL ENHANCEMENT PROGRAM & FACILITIES

We had a good turnout in February with 5 participants in the first session and 3 in the second session. The comfort level with the skew chisel has been ratcheted up!

The March Skills Enhancement sessions will focus on goblets and tool making/use based on what will be demonstrated by Chuck Engstrom at our March meeting. In addition, any members, especially newer members and/or novice turners interested in basic turning technique, sanding/finishing assistance or sharpening assistance are encouraged to sign up. I plan to be attend and provide guidance and assistance at both sessions. The dates and times are –
