## August Program - Mark Gardner

Mark Gardner has been working with wood since he was a teenager. He took his first woodturning class in 1996 at Arrowmont from John Jordan and went on to assist John there for the next four years. He credits John for giving him a firm foundation of turning techniques and for inspiration in his early vessels. Mark then assisted the famed wood artist Stoney Lamar and shared his studio for six years. There

he was strongly influenced in areas of design and technique, and also learned to expand on his approach to the lathe to use it as a tool to aid further carving and texturing. Mark has also been influenced by the surface work of Clay Foster, by furniture makers, and by designs from the ceremonial and utilitarian objects of Africa and Oceania. He is now widely known for his own signature sculpture and vessels involving unique shapes, multiple axes, coloring, carving, and texturing.

Mark, who lives and works in North Carolina, has taught at craft schools around the country and has demonstrated widely. He has won a number of awards, and his works have been in a large number of exhibits and can be found in many public and private collections. Mark took part in the International Turning Exchange at The Woodturning Center in 2001 and has been featured in several books, including two of my favorites: 500 Wood Bowls and New Masters of Woodturning.

Mark says: "Hollow forms turned through a small opening were always a challenge for me to turn. In this demo I'll show how I make hollow forms, using green

wood, much like you make lidded boxes only I'll glue the lid back on. Not only is there less risk of turning through the side of your vessel, but it is also

easier to gauge the wall thickness, as well as remove the shavings from the inside. I'll focus on techniques for making a precise joint to help ensure that the piece stays together as it dries. Time will be spent demonstrating various ways to hide the seam in your vessel. This vessel will also have handles." If there is time, Mark will also briefly discuss the texturing and coloring techniques he uses on such vessels.

## **President's Perspective (Tim Aley)**

## WWC MOVE

Matt Nauman spoke about the store's move. He said that due to storms, the move is postponed to September. The new store and shop will both be about double in size. They plan to have a photo and project gallery in the entryway with a potential consignment sales opportunity that we will have an opportunity to take advantage of. The Woodworking area will be separated from the sales area and It will have a separate main Woodworking Studio, a Classroom and, a Large Woodturning Studio area.



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## The Beginner's Corner (Steve Drake)



The survey for June asked about how people finish their projects. This is one of the most confusing parts for a beginning turner, in large part because there are so many choices. There is even a National Institute of Wood Finishing which offers 28 different associates degrees in finishing methods and technology. The makeup and uses of various finishes has been examined in depth on the web and I have included a few web links at the end for people to reference.

This article is about the variety of finishes that our members use. As expected, the consensus among the members is that, while there is some agreement on sandpaper grit, there is no consensus for which finish to use. Everyone does something fairly different and unique according to what works for his or her taste.

Of the 18 responses (21% of the membership), over 60% felt that larger items should receive a final sanding with 400 grit sandpaper. A few stop sanding at 220 or 320 and one went to 600 grit. For small items like pens, there was more uniformity. Most seem to feel that a finer grit is important and will sand to 600 grit. Many use EEE Ultrashine for an even smoother feel. A few members go into the range of 1500-4000 grit for their finest small wood products although one person felt that sanding beyond 600 can actually inhibit an oil based finish from absorbing. For acrylic items, members use autobody sandpaper with grits as fine as 12,000 to 22,000 and some use compound buffing after that.

For the type of sandpaper, most people seem to like the aluminum oxide either on paper, cloth, or on a sponge. One member commented that garnet sandpaper seems to give more persistent sanding scratches. Several people commented that sandpaper is <u>relatively cheap and</u> disposable and should be used and thrown out. Using fresh sandpaper and a light touch lets the sandpaper do the work rather than the person.

The biggest problem people noted with preparing a piece for finishing oil is the sudden appearance of a tool mark when half-way through sanding. The only consensus that people had for solving this was to do as much of the work while it is still on the lathe rather then try to take it off, deal with the problem, and then try to re-mount the piece. One person recommended using a magnifying glass before advancing to the next grit of sandpaper in order to catch these problems. Many people resort to other power tools to remove a persistent tool mark when only the one area needs special attention. The most common tools used are Dremels, a detail sander, or an orbital sander. One member found that spraying water or the final finishing oil on a persistent tool mark will soften the fibers and make it easier to sand the mark away. Several people said that if they are turning "punky" wood, they will apply either a wood hardener or a coat or two of finish to stabilize the wood and make the final cutting/sanding smoother and easier with less tear out. The rule that several of the more experienced turners seem to use is to spend about as much time sanding as they do turning.

For applying the finish, most people use a wipe on and wipe off technique with some rubbing the oil in carefully while the item is on the lathe. One member likes to apply finishing oils like walnut oil or boiled linseed oil as a wet sanding agent with 400 or 600 grit sandpaper on the lathe then rubbing it in with a Scotchbrite pad. Two members use the Beal Buffing system and feel it gives a superior smooth finish for less effort and fewer problems. It was also commented that it takes time to build an oil finish.

Multiple light coats are preferred since heavy coats of oil take longer to harden and the finish may bleed out in a day or two. One member discovered that when he was unpacking pieces for a show.

There are a huge variety of finishes used among the members and a number of them are custom mixes. Some people avoid high gloss finishes because they tend to highlight any minor flaw while others prefer the high gloss look. Following is a list of the ones sent to me and any comments on what they are used for.

## **List of Finishes Used by Members**

Mineral oil for utilitarian items like kitchen utensils.

Mineral oil - beeswax

Rottenstone - mineral oil - beeswax - 1:1:1

Boiled Linseed oil - beeswax for food

Boiled Linseed oil and then beeswax friction rub for handles

Boiled linseed oil - oil-based polyurethane - lacquer - 1:1:1

CA glue

Salad Bowl Finish

Salad Bowl Finish - Waterlox - 1:1

Walnut oil for food

Walnut Finishing Oil from Doctor's Woodshop

Danish oil for non-food bowls and vases.

Tung oil

Waterlox

Waterlox - tung oil 1:1

Nitrocellulose Lacquer for art vessels

Epoxy coating for food

Triple-E plus Shellawax for small items,

Hut 2 part wax finish for small items

Wipe-on poly for the most protection and/or shine.

Bioshield herbal oil #2 for food and some dark woods

Deft semigloss lacquer aerosol for light woods.

Any oil finish then lacquer over it but the oil must be TOTALLY cured first or the lacquer will come off.

Behlen's Woodturner's Finish for high gloss

Mineral oil mixed with Shellawax paste,

Shellac as the first coat---rub out with 320 sandpaper then Waterlox orginal

Spar varnish (non-poly versions) for items that come in contact with water.

Epoxy as an initial sanding sealant/wood hardener then re-sand smooth and apply whatever oil desired.

Spray can of polyurethane or lacquer for Xmas ornaments.

## Finishing (cont.)

The problems people have had with finishes are as varied as their finishes. For example, some people use almost exclusively use Tung oil or the Salad Bowl finish while several other members complained that they have had great problems with these finishes and prefer other finishes.

The recommendation was made that lacquered pieces which develop a drip or blister can be put back on the lathe where light sanding with 320 or 400 paper followed by 0000 steel wool usually removes the problem cleanly.

The members did have a few common complaints. First, most people complain that there is not a good way to save a bottle/can of finish. After a finish has been opened and exposed to air, it will go bad in a matter of months so most members end up throwing out half-used cans of finish. Secondly, while most finishes are toxic to the woodturner while they are wet, once the solvents evaporate and the finish cures, then they are all food safe. The exception is if the finish contains lead or some other toxic metal as a drying agent in which case food use should be avoided.

One of our more experienced members had this bit of advice for finishes. Finishing a piece is a time-consuming process. Being in a hurry with finishes will ruin the best piece of turning so don't make any promises on timing and DON'T accept any deadlines.

#### October 11, 2012 – Ernie Conover – TBD

It would be held on the evening on which we would otherwise normally meet, were we not doing the above Liam O'Neill event.

Ernie Conover is a well-known author in the woodworking field with ten books, many videos, and hundreds of articles to his credit. His work has received numerous awards and been the subject of several one-man shows. Ernie is a long-time contributor to *Fine Woodworking*, a furniture maker, and a tool afficionado. While he is best known for teaching and writing about woodturning, he is also called upon as a machine designer, having designed and marketed the Conover lathe. 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#### October 18, 2012 - Liam O'Neill - topic TBD

Note that this meeting is one week after our normal meeting date, to accommodate Liam's travel schedule. This will be our normal, complete meeting for the month.

Liam O'Neill is one of the true legends in woodturning. He will be visiting from his workshop in County Galway, Ireland. Liam is the "Irish" in the "Irish Grind" for bowl gouges, which design variation he introduced to people like David Ellsworth in 1982. In 1983, he was a founder of the Irish Woodturners Guild, the world's first national woodturning organization. In that time frame, he won several national First Prizes for his woodturnings and also a scholarship to travel to the U.S.A. to study advanced woodturning with leading American Woodturners such as Bob Stocksdale and David Ellsworth. While here in 1986, he played a part in the formation of the AAW.

Liam has been a production turner and also an educator, having taught at Arrowmont for ten years. He makes everything on a lathe from traditional pieces to massive outdoor sculptures. The development of woodturning techniques has always been important to him. He is a master craftsman and wood artist with a unique understanding of his medium. It is said that the quality of his bowls lies in their subtle detailing

as well as the intrinsic beauty of the wood. Even so, his interests have always lain in the way in which he could use woodturning creatively to make unique sculptural pieces. For the latter, which are found in many international collections, Liam has specially designed and built a large, outdoor lathe with a concrete headstock sporting a 2.5" spindle, a nearly 6-foot swing, a 12-hp motor, an integrally mounted chainsaw, and a gantry for lifting logs into place!

Interest in Liam's work has grown enormously in recent years, fuelled by high-profile commissions and the fact that examples of his work have been presented to leading world figures as gifts from the Irish Government.
