If the next level is making that curve continuous all the way through the bowl, doing the extra bit of sanding and finishing, or trying to perfect a signature piece, we try a little harder. Wherever you are in your journey you will have the opportunity to get your work out there this year. If you are ready for



the challenge we are now a member of the Creative Craft Council and have the opportunity to submit items for the bi-annual show. We are also planning to have more library displays to promote the club and get our work in front of hundreds of people who may someday be buyers or call us when a tree comes down. If you are just getting started, we always have Show and Tell at meetings, so take your turning to the next level and show it off.

As a woodturning club, one of our main goals is to promote woodturning. We do this by having meetings, a website and newsletter. We advertise at the Woodworkers Club, displaying our work in galleries and libraries, and do demonstrations for the public. It was explained that Skills Enhancement sessions are "open" turning opportunities to perfect one's skills and techniques with mentoring and a couple of members endorsed the usefulness of these sessions. 
For Bert:

We Will Demonstrate at Brookside

We have accepted an invitation to show our turning skills at the Forest Friends Festival at Brookside Nature Center in Wheaton on Sunday April 28th from 11 AM to 4 PM. We will set up two lathes and a grinder under a canopy, much like we do at the County Fair. Phil will provide a sign up sheet for approximately 9 volunteers. You should plan to bring your own cutting tools and wood. To simplify set up, the black boxes of tools and supplies from the Fair will not be at this site. In several respects this venue will be a learning and exploratory experience for us.

This endeavor includes the opportunity to sell your work directly to the public from a display table at our booth area. To avoid conflicts with taxing authorities, you should obtain a license

to collect sales tax. I hope this will not deter any interested member from participating. You can get a 30-day permit by calling the Special Events Section of the Comptroller's office at 410-767-1543. MCW Joins the Creative Crafts Council

Jointly with Capital Area Woodturners, MCW has joined the Creative Crafts Council (CCC), an incorporated and volunteer run collaboration of craft organizations (guilds) in the metropolitan area. The CCC has operated for over 50 years for the purpose of providing a biannual marketing outlet for its member guilds.

Currently the CCC is a consortium of 9 crafts guilds, including the National Capital Art Glass Guild, the Ceramics Guild of Bethesda, Montgomery Potters, Washington Guild of Goldsmiths, The Kiln Club, National Enamelist Guild, Potomac Fiber Arts Guild, and the Fiber Arts Study

Group. The recently added the Capital Area and Montgomery County Woodturners is the ninth Guild member. Based on these groups, the media classifications for the show are ceramics, polymer clay, glass, metal (mostly jewelry), enamel, fiber, wood, and mixed media.

CAW member Gerry Headley is representing our combined chapters on the CCC board. The alternate representative is Phil Brown.

The Creative Crafts Council is pleased to announce a call for entries for its 29th Biennial juried fine craft exhibit to showcase outof-the-ordinary crafts in the areas of ceramics, enamel, fiber, glass, metal, mixed media, polymer, and wood.

The show will be on display at the Mansion at Strathmore in Bethesda from May 4th to June 15th 2013. The Artists' Opening Reception and Awards Ceremony will be Thursday, May 16th.

To apply for this show, all entries must be submitted online. The application will contain information about the artist and about the piece(s), and photographs of the work must also be included.

All work must be the original work of the artist and must have been completed within two years of the entry deadline.

All entries must be installation-ready with appropriate hanging rods or mounting devices if necessary.

All accepted work must be at Strathmore by April 29th - no exceptions.

Entry Fee: Up to four pieces may be submitted for \$35 (CCC members) and \$50 (non-members).

All artwork must be for sale. A 40% commission is taken on all sales by Strathmore (yes, this is an increase from previous years).

The website for the online application will be available only from February 22nd until March 22nd. The link to the application will be on the CCC website, www.creativecraftscouncil.org, on 2/22/2013.















Every other (odd) year the CCC sponsors a juried craft show in the Mansion at Strathmore, 10701 Rockville Pike, North Bethesda, Marvland. Artist members of the member quilds listed above receive a discount on the entry fee and may submit up to four entries per person in any media (e.g., two glass entries and two pottery entries, but no more the four entries across all the craft media areas). The CCC and the craft guilds sponsor a number of awards for best entries. The Strathmore gift shop handles sales from the show, and this year will retain 40 percent of the sales price set by the artists.

In keeping with our advancing digital age, you will submit your application on line, including photos of the submitted pieces for jurying. The 2013 Creative Crafts Council application is being developed and tested now, and will be available on the CCC web site, www.creativecraftscouncil.org, on February 22nd with final submissions due by March 22nd. On or before April 15th, you will be notified about pieces accepted into the show. April 29th is the date for delivering your pieces to the Strathmore Mansion, and June 17th is the day to pick up unsold work. The show will be up May 4th to June 15th. The artist opening is Thursday evening May 16th, and a public talk occurs on May 18th.

Adam Kenney, Executive Director of **Touchstone Center for Crafts** in PA (touchstonecrafts.org), will give a talk entitled "Balancing Act: Successfully synthesizing personal, professional, financial and artistic goals into a sustainable creative career", and also tell us about the upcoming craft classes at Touchstone (no woodturning). Since these subjects ap-

ply to any and all craft artists, the CCC has agreed to co-sponsor this event with WGG.

Adam is keen to meet with members of the CCC guilds and was most responsive to the CCC auction last year, giving us both a certificate for a free class at Touchstone and one of his own glass vases to include in the auction.

Solo Exhibition Opportunity

The Appalachian Center for Craft Exhibition Committee is reviewing digital images for solo or group exhibitions for three exhibition spaces at the Appalachian Center for Craft for the years 2014-2015. All media will be considered. Three different spaces are available: GALLERY ONE (700 sq. ft.), GALLERY TWO (1430 sq. ft.), and NORTH WINDOWS GALLERY (406 sq. ft.)

All works are insured. There is a 40% Gallery commission on sales. The Gallery will provide one-way return shipping up to \$300.

• March 7, 2013 – Mary May – wood carving on bowls and platters

In cooperation with the Woodworkers Club, we will be hosting the nationally-known woodcarver, Mary May, who will conduct a *Wood Carving for Turners* Demonstration.

Mary will focus on:

- The basics carving tools, sharpening supplies, tool selection, sharpening, carving basics
- Holding the work carving on the lathe / carving off the lathe.

Carving on turned objects - low relief, high relief, sculpturing

Simply stated, Mark Sfirri is a legendary master of eccentric, multi-axis turning. He's famous for many shapes, among which are his "figures", baseball bats, spoons, and candle sticks. His unique and instantly recognizable works are in the best museums and collections. We have seen them in our field trips, and they are always very eye-catching. We enjoyed a demo by Mark in September 2010, and we are more than ready for another.

Mark holds Bachelors and Masters of Fine Arts degrees from Rhode Island School of Design (which is extremely prestigious). He is a resident of New Hope, PA where he is a teacher, furniture maker, and sculptor, in addition to being a world-famous woodturner. Mark has taught at Bucks County Community College since 1981 as an Associate Professor of Fine Woodworking. He is a prolific writer and has seven pages of publications to his credit, including many articles in *American Woodturner* and *Fine Woodturning*. In 2010, he received a national award from the James Renwick Alliance as one of three *Distinguished Educators*.

Mark injects humor into his work through form and surface orientation. Much of his work *'centers'* around lathe turned objects and shapes. This is a bit of a pun because most of his pieces are turned on several axes to produce both motion and (as he likes to say) simultaneity of multiple perspectives. This has allowed him to explore form in a spontaneous and creative way. Even though many of his pieces appear to be carved, they are mostly turned. He continually blurs the line separating woodturning from sculpture. It is fair to say that his approach has played an important role in public recognition of the evolution of studio wood turning into a contemporary art form. Mark will show us how to make magic. He will also be teaching another highly-recommended Class at the Woodworkers Club. Check their web site and talk to Matt about signing up. There will be a demo fee.

October 17, 2013 – Mark Gardner – multi-axis bowl

[Please note that this is one week later than our normal meeting day.]

We also look forward to Mark Gardner returning to us in 2013 to show us the unique manner in which he turns a multi-axis bowl -- including the use of 2x4's and hot-melt glue, a technique with wide appeal and application. Mark has been working with wood since he was a teenager. He took his first woodturning class in 1996 at Arrowmont from John Jordan and went on to assist John there for the next four years. He credits John for giving him a firm foundation of turning techniques and for inspiration in his early vessels. Mark then assisted the famed wood artist Stoney Lamar and shared his studio for six years. There he was strongly influenced in areas of design and technique, and also learned to expand on his approach to the lathe to use it as a tool to aid further carving and texturing. He is now widely known for his own signature sculpture and vessels involving unique shapes, multiple axes, coloring, carving, and texturing. See http://markgardnerstudio.com. Mark is a superior teacher who has taught woodturning at craft schools around the country. He has won a number of awards, and his works have been in a large number of exhibits and can be found in many public and private collections. We really enjoyed Mark's class and demo in 2012 and want to see more. 
