September Program - Mark Sfirri Multi-axis Truning

Simply stated, Mark Sfirri is a legendary master of eccentric, multi-axis turning. He's famous for many shapes, among which are his "figures", baseball bats, spoons, and candle sticks. His unique and instantly recognizable works are in the best museums and collections. We have seen them in our field trips, and they are always very eye-catching. We enjoyed a demo by Mark in September 2010, and we are more than ready for another.





September Program - Mark Sfirri Multi-axis Turning



Mark holds Bachelors and Masters of Fine Arts degrees from Rhode Island School of Design (which is extremely prestigious). He is a resident of New Hope, PA where he is a teacher, furniture maker, and sculptor, in addition to being a world-famous woodturners. Mark has taught at Bucks County Community College since 1981 as an Associate Professor of Fine Woodworking. He is a prolific writer and has seven pages of publications to his credit, including many articles in *American Woodturner* and *Fine Woodturning*. In 2010, he received a national award from the James Renwick Alliance as one of three *Distinguished Educators*.



Mark injects humor into his work through form and surface orientation. Much of his work 'centers' around lathe turned objects and shapes. This is a bit of a pun because most of his pieces are turned on several axes to produce both motion and (as he likes to say) simultaneity of multiple perspectives. This has allowed him to explore form in a spontaneous and creative way.





Even though many of his pieces appear to be carved, they are mostly turned. He continually blurs the line separating woodturning from sculpture. It is fair to say that his approach has played an important role in public recognition of the evolution of studio wood turning into a contemporary art form. Mark will show us how to make magic. He will also be teaching another highly-recommended Class at the Woodworkers Club. Check their web site and talk to Matt about signing up. There will be a demo fee.

President's Perspective (Tim Aley) SCHOLARSHIP LETTER FROM AAW

Greetings Tim Aley,

New Scholarships to Arrowmont and John C. Campbell

Schools Available to AAW Members

The AAW Board of Directors is extremely excited to announce a new scholarship initiative. In recognition of the invaluable contributions made by our local chapters to our educational mission, twenty-seven scholarships to two of the nation's leading woodturning centers will be provided in 2014 to members of the American Association of Woodturners. We strongly encourage all chapters to help us promote this important new opportunity for our AAW members.

Under the program, the AAW Endowment Trust Fund (ETF) and the Arrowment School of Arts and Crafts will make available funds for 14 \$550 scholarships at Arrowment School of Arts and Crafts. In addition, the ETF, working with John C. Campbell Folk School will award 13 \$594 scholarships. All together, 27 scholarships will be awarded. In total, \$15,422 in scholarships will be given to AAW members.

In order to apply for the scholarships, nominees must be an AAW members and be nominated by their AAW Chapter. Star Chapters will be allotted two nominations for the first 50 members and an additional nominee for each additional 50 members. Regular chapters will be allotted one nomination for the first 50 AAW members in the chapter. After that, each additional 50 AAW members will allow another nomination. If there are more than 27 nominations, a drawing will determine the winners.

The program is to provide tuition only. Any room and board and travel to the school locations will remain the responsibility of the nominee. John C. Campbell Folk School is located in Brasstown, NC; Arrowmont is in Gatlinburg, TN. All classes will take place in 2014.

Chapters must provide the names of nominees, the number of chapter members and the number of AAW members in the chapter to Saint Paul, MN headquarters by November 15, 2013. Within two weeks from that date, the winners will be notified.

We deeply appreciate all you do to support the AAW. Please don't hesitate to contact the AAW office if you would like more information about this new initiative.

At Dick Webster's recommendation, Gary shared Dick's exciting experience with a shop fire. A spark from grinding tools fell on some fine steel wool and quickly ignited it. Fortunately, Dick was able to extinguish the flame promptly, but it was a wake-up call about how complacent we turners can become when it comes to being alert to potential fire hazards around our shop.

Wood shavings, finishing oils, fine grinding and sanding dust, etc., all are easily ignitable by a stray spark from a grinder or other ignition source. For those who work in metal also, the ignited combo of aluminum swarf with steel wool can generate an intense fire.

Members' comments strongly endorsed the grounding of dust collector tubing to dissipate static electricity. Gary also pointed out the spontaneous combustion hazard presented by improper disposal of oily rags. They can generate enough heat to ignite and burn. They should be taken outside and spread out to thoroughly dry before disposal. Several members spoke up in affirmation of Dick's and Gary's cautions.

<u>Demo Program</u>

The evening program was presented by Ed Karch, demonstrating the turning of Salad Servers and discussion of techniques and accessories he has found useful. The program engaged the interest of all and appreciation was shown by a rousing round of applause following his presentation.

The meeting adjourned at 9:00pm

In response to the email announcement about the limber "lumberjills" behind our turning booth at the County Fair, **Ed Karsh** replied that "I used to do that stuff in my youth. I won the pole felling championship at the southern forestry conclave in Florida in the early 60s."

Montgomery County Fair

MCW members provided a nice presence for wood and turned work at the Montgomery County Fair in August with 9 pieces by 5 members. (I believe the quality of our wood pieces was considerably better than the quality of most other craft items on display.) With our entries spread over seven classes (categories), there were award ribbons for everyone, with two champion pieces displayed in the entryway award case.

Allan Starr received 1st Place in Models and the Golden Years Award as Grand Champion in the Educational and Recreational Hobbies Division for his *1931 Cadillac Roadster* (Jatoba wood with Zebrawood seats, Maple and Ipe grill, and Oak trunk with walnut strapping).

Phil Brown received 1st Place in Bowls and Adult Champion Rosette in Wood Craft for a *Red Cedar Vessel*, Rings of Time VIII, measuring 12" high by 11" in diameter on a 2.5" base.

Tim Aley's Christmas Ornament won a 1st Place ribbon in Tree Ornaments .

Margaret Fallas received a 1st Place ribbon in Wood Carving for her *turned platter with chip carving* enhancements.

Allan Starr received 1st Place ribbons for his *Bulldozer* (in Handmade Toys) and for the replica of a 1928 Chevy Pickup Truck (in Wood Craft, Flat Work).

Allan received a 2nd Place ribbon for the Working Model of a "*Skid-Steer*" tractor (by Bobcat).

Tim received a 2nd Place ribbon in Bowls for his *three-nested bowls* in Box Elder.

Bert Bleckwenn received a 3rd Place ribbon for his *Cherry Crotch Platter*.

On getting acquainted with Tudor Place

As an outreach activity, I have encouraged members to make a bowl from a white oak tree taken down at Tudor Place, an historic estate in Georgetown. This project was described on page 9 of the June 2013 MCW newsletter.

They offer a tour, *Historic & Growing: The Tudor Place Landscape*, described as: "Indulge in the history and horticulture of centuries-old trees, heirloom plants and flowers and fragrant English boxwood on a lively guided walk across 5.5 acres and two centuries of landscape design. Learn how Tudor Place reflects both its Federal-period origins and changes in land use over time. See how orchards, vegetable gardens, stables and grazing land made way for lawns, rose gardens, fountains and the various garden "rooms" of an urban estate. Identify many varieties cultivated here over time, and see how four owners over six generations of one family cared for and embellished the landscape, while Georgetown and the Federal city grew around it. Offered monthly on first Tuesdays, March-October. Advance registration encouraged but not required."

EVENING PROGRAM - Ed Karch, Turning Salad Servers

Mike Colella introduced fellow MCW member Ed Karch who presented the evening's program on making salad bowl servers.



Ed discussed the influence of the wood carver community in Virginia, and described the woods used in his utensils: Mountain Laurel, Crepe Myrtle, Beech, Sycamore, Cherry, Elm, Grapevine, Yellow Poplar, River Birch, etc...all native hardwoods. He referred to Hogbin's latest book "On Woodturning" that showed a similar set of salad servers to those that he makes.





He described the tools and accessories he finds useful. Though maybe not conventional, Ed showed how they are used to good effect in specialty turning as his demonstration showed. Some of these are: Luthier tools for smoothing wood (www.stuartmcdonnell.com), Flexcut carving tools, Sticky tape to wrap tool handles, Carving glove and Leather thumb and finger guards (www.widgetsupply.com), Sharpening strop, with leather on one side and 1000 grit emory cloth on the other (yellow compound on leather).









The turning demo showed how he starts with an approximate 4" diameter log, turned to a smooth cylinder. Then shape to salad server contour, and bandsaw lengthwise in half to create the two paired salad server pieces. These pieces are then carved and shaped further by hand and the handles may be steam bent if desired.

The result of his demo yielded a very nice set of serving blanks, which are now ready for carving the hollows in the 'business end' of the servers and finishing with food-safe treatments.

Members showed high interest throughout Ed's presentation with many questions and comments. The assembly showed their appreciation with applause at the end of the meeting.

September 12, 2013 – Mark Sfirri – multiaxis topic TBD

Simply stated, Mark Sfirri is a legendary master of eccentric, multi-axis turning. He's famous for many shapes, among which are his "figures", baseball bats, spoons, and candle sticks. His unique and instantly recognizable works are in the best museums and collections. We have seen them in our field trips, and they are always very eye-catching. We enjoyed a demo by Mark in September 2010, and we are more than ready for another.

Mark holds Bachelors and Masters of Fine Arts degrees from Rhode Island School of Design (which is extremely prestigious). He is a resident of New Hope, PA where he is a teacher, furniture maker, and sculptor, in addition to being a world-famous woodturners. Mark has taught at Bucks County Community College since 1981 as an Associate Professor of Fine Woodworking. He is a prolific writer and has seven pages of publications to his credit, including many articles in *American Woodturner* and *Fine Woodturning*. In 2010, he received a national award from the James Renwick Alliance as one of three *Distinguished Educators*.

Mark injects humor into his work through form and surface orientation. Much of his work 'centers' around lathe turned objects and shapes. This is a bit of a pun because most of his pieces are turned on several axes to produce both motion and (as he likes to say) simultaneity of multiple perspectives. This has allowed him to explore form in a spontaneous and creative way. Even though many of his pieces appear to be carved, they are mostly turned. He continually blurs the line separating woodturning from sculpture. It is fair to say that his approach has played an important role in public recognition of the evolution of studio wood turning into a contemporary art form. Mark will show us how to make magic. He will also be teaching another highly-recommended Class at the Woodworkers Club. Check their web site and talk to Matt about signing up. There will be a demo fee.

• October 17, 2013 - Mark Gardner - multi-axis bowl

[Please note that this is *one week later* than our normal meeting day.]

We also look forward to Mark Gardner returning to us in 2013 to show us the unique manner in which he turns a multi-axis bowl -- including the use of 2x4's and hot-melt glue, a technique with wide appeal and application. Mark has been working with wood since he was a teenager. He took his first woodturning class in 1996 at Arrowmont from John Jordan and went on to assist John there for the next four years. He credits John for giving him a firm foundation of turning techniques and for inspiration in his early vessels. Mark then assisted the famed wood artist Stoney Lamar and shared his studio for six years. There he was strongly influenced in areas of design and technique, and also learned to expand on his approach to the lathe to use it as a tool to aid further carving and texturing. He is now widely known for his own signature sculpture and vessels involving unique shapes, multiple axes, coloring, carving, and texturing. See http://markgardnerstudio.com. Mark is a superior teacher who has taught woodturning at craft schools around the country. He has won a number of awards, and his works have been in a large number of exhibits and can be found in many public and private collections. We really enjoyed Mark's class and demo in 2012 and want to see more.
