President's Perspective (Tim Aley)

Woodturing is great fun and even profitable for some. I spent two recent weekends promoting woodturing by demoing with the Mid-MD Woodturners. I do this because I think everyone should be turning. I try really hard to also promote safety. I try to use a face shield when I demo and use the S.A.F.E.R method but I notice sometimes with the distractions and unfamiliar equipment I will forget one of my checklist items and I have to stop and start over. I have tried to "Establish a Safety Culture" with my turning. I know that I



have been doing most of it for many years and now I am trying to make safety second nature.

Accidents happen, but we can try to lessen the frequency and severity by educating ourselves on the dangers and ways to avoid them. I know most of you may not go to those links and/or might think that you already know all the tips. But I implore you to think about safety every time you go to the shop. I will bring the AAW book for anyone who wants to borrow it for the month.

We are trying to establish a safety culture at the meetings as well. We ask our demonstrators to demonstrate safety and safely. Most professional turners have already planned for this in how they work. We also have a safety talk at every meeting. This is usually a short talk and for some new to turning it is often the first talk they have heard the topic. For the rest of us it gives us a time to review our own safety steps. I know that all of this takes time away from demos and turning, but it is not fun to injure yourself and not be able to turn for a long time. Establish you own Safety Culture.

<u>Phil Brown Appreciation</u>: Gary Guenther noted this month to be the one-year anniversary of Liam O'Neill's demo for MCW. This is a suitable occasion to honor Phil for his dogged persistence and effort to keep MCW supplied with silent auction wood, organizing our local library exhibitions and many other acts of service. Last year Phil donated a piece of curly elm for Liam's bowl turning demonstration. Liam donated the bowl to MCW and over the past 11 months, Gary dried and finished it into a presentation piece to Phil from the original curly elm blank he had furnished to Liam.

Safety Notes

Gary Guenther spoke about the nuisance of bringing 'buggy' wood into the house from outdoors. Woodturners, and woodworkers in general, should be careful in doing so and make sure that the little critters are rendered harmless by thorough cleaning the wood before bringing indoors, or by zapping the smaller pieces in the microwave.

Gary's "Toxic Wood of the Month" is Toon (*cedrela toona*), or Australian Red Cedar, the dust of which is known to cause severe dermatitis and respiratory distress in some individuals. Wear breathing protection.

Both Gary and Tim touted the AAW's new booklet "AAW Safety Tips," a copy of which was on hand for members' viewing. It contains thorough discussions of avoiding many shop hazards and should be read by all to prevent personal injury and equipment damage.

EVENING PROGRAM – Mark Gardner

Three-axis Square Bowl

Tim Aley introduced our guest demonstrator, Mark Gardner, a wood artist and turner of distinction, who was in the city conducting a workshop for the Woodworkers Club. Mark is a past demonstrator for MCW, and it was a pleasure to have him return. His demonstration topic was the multi-axis turning of a square bowl.

By way of background, Mark resides in Saluda, NC where he has his studio. He has been involved with woodturning since he was sixteen. At that time, he enrolled in a furniture making class with his father. Feeling that furniture making was a slow process, he found the immediacy of turning to be very satisfying. Eventually, he took a class with John Jordan and credits him with giving him a firm foundation in turning



techniques. Mark holds a BFA in Theatre Design and Production, College Conservatory of Music, University of Cincinnati and has turning and cabinet-making workshops under his belt. His approach to turning has also been heavily influenced by Stoney Lamar, who considers the lathe as more a tool for carving than turning and this perspective has been an inspiration for Mark. He has also studied African and Oceanic artifacts, and these can be seen in his work. The lathe is still Mark's primary tool and he enjoys the process of turning. However, most of his time is spent working on a piece after it has been turned. He specializes in vessels and bowls.



Mark demonstrated the making of his square bowl that is turned on three axes. He glued two pieces of 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ " x 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ " thick hardwood together, roughly 5-6" long, forming a rectangular blank about 5" x 5" x 5". Dry wood is used because wet/green wood would move after the turning process, and because the piece cannot tolerate warping in the glueup. Using the bandsaw, the blank is sawed grainwise into a rough cylinder. The cylinder is then mounted on the lathe with the centers on the parting line of the two-piece blank.




<u>First Axis:</u> With a ¹/2" bowl gouge, Mark turned the blank to a true cylinder, using a shear cut and sighting along the lathe axis, checking frequently with straight edge and calipers. Once the cylinder was turned true, it was removed from the lathe, rotated 90 degrees and recentered on the lathe. <u>Second Axis:</u> Using a roughing gouge, Mark turned the piece to a new cylinder shape. A contour gage was used to ensure that separate surface convergence was achieved.

After finishing this step, the piece was taken from the lathe and the two halves were split, providing two blanks with four curved lower surfaces and a flat top. The next step was to fashion a holding jig for the bowl blank. This was accomplished using a large diameter ³/₄" plywood faceplate on which was mounted the holding pieces. These pieces were fashioned by sawing out support blocks from 2" x 4" stock, with the curved

ing a masking tape interface between the workpiece and the holding jig pieces. Before the glue set, the workpiece was precisely leveled in relationship to the faceplate plane. The entire assembly was then mounted on the lathe and centered for the final turning, which comprises the

<u>Third Axis:</u> With the bowl blank trued on the faceplate and holding jig, the bowl can now be hollowed, sanded, and the top surface treated in any way the turner wishes. The workpiece and jig were removed from the faceplate and the piece knocked out of the jig.



Removal of the masking tape and other cleanup can be done. The workpiece is then remounted on the plywood surface using the tailstock with the pin removed so that centering could be adjusted. A flat area was turned on the bottom so that the piece would sit flat.



The club members' attention was focused throughout the demonstration and with the usual Q and A, showed their appreciated with a vigorous round of applause.
