Opening Remarks:

Following a substantial Pot Luck dinner, President Tim Aley called the meeting to order at 7:00pm, welcoming members and guests and thanking those who contributed to the potluck. Approximately 32 members/guests were in attendance.

Announcements and Updates:

Newsletter:

Tim reminded members to share their experience by submitting stories to the Newsletter. Dues Review:

Tim reported that officers recently discussed the level of dues, given the various costs of our woodturning club. In response to members' questions, Tim noted that the fees for 'recognized' demonstrators range around \$400, more or less, depending on fame and whether or not MCW can "piggyback" on a WWC workshop. In addition there are transportation and accommodation and meal expenses. Discussions are taking place with adjacent woodturning clubs to see if we can schedule demonstrators so that the per diem expenses can be shared. After further discussion, it was decided that the dues should remain at \$20/year through 2014, with the possibility of a modest raise beyond that date.

Tim announced that election of officers will take place at the December meeting, noting that all incumbents have indicated a willingness to continue to serve another year, unless other members would like an opportunity to serve.

<u>MCW Skills Enhancement</u> took place on Friday November 9 at the WWC. Next session is scheduled for Sunday December 8. These monthly sessions provide opportunities for members to experiment and practice new techniques, try new tools, and share acquired knowledge. [Skills Enhancement sessions are "open" turning opportunities to perfect one's skills and techniques with mentoring and members who have participated enthusiastically endorse the usefulness of these sessions. Use of WWC lathes and supplies and tools by MCW are provided. They are held on one Friday or Sunday in alternate months. <u>Participants must be active AAW members in order to participate and be covered by the AAW Liability Insurance Policy.</u> The schedule for the year is given on the MCW website.]

MCW Wounded Warrior Project: The two most recent Pen Turning sessions (Oct 16th and 30th) with WRAMC's Wounded Warriors drew 8 and 6 soldiers respectively, but only three MCW volunteers (including Don van Ryk, the coordinator). A plea was made to members to step up to support this great service project. WWC's Chris Johnstone was able to step in to augment the mentoring crew. Ideally, we'd like to have a one-on-one mentoring/tutorial for each soldier, since most of them have never done much woodworking before, let alone any lathe work. This ongoing MCW project is very popular with our service folks from Wal-



ter Reed Hospital's Rehab Unit. The sessions invariably produce very happy participating service members, showing great pride in their 'very own' turned pens.

The sessions take place on alternate Wednesdays at the Woodworkers Club with the next sessions being held from 12:30pm-2:30pm on November 13th, November 17th and alternate following Wednesdays.

This is a great program to assist in the rehabilitation of our wounded soldiers in developing interest and skills in woodturning, using pen turning as the focus. MCW members provide mentoring and encouragement to these folks, some of whom have never before done any woodworking or woodturning. It is a wonderful effort that benefits both student and mentor. Members were urged to consider volunteering and to contact Don van Ryk (<u>dvanryk@aol.com</u>) to participate.

Thanks to those MCW member volunteers who have been able to show up to mentor these good people.

Turn for the Troops!:

Tim announced that the annual pre-Veterans Day "Turn for the Troops" event will be held at the Woodworkers Club on Saturday and Sunday, November 9th and 10th from 10am-1pm and 2pm-6pm with lunch served between 1pm and 2pm. It has been tradition for MCW members to pitch in and help the WWC staff turn pens for distribution to our troops in domestic and overseas postings. Last year the effort resulted in about 110 pens produced by volunteers and staff. Safety Notes - Sound

Gary Guenther's Safety Topic this month was "Sound," and how it can be your early warning sign of approaching danger or disaster. Even with hearing protection, the subtle sounds of the lathe or work piece can be heard. Sound may vary with the rotational speed of the lathe, warning of too high or too low rpm. All of us have heard the sounds of tool against wood and gradually learned to listen to whether a tool is beginning to become dull (and susceptible to digs or gouging) or is cutting cleanly. Cutting with or against the grain produces unique sounds that also vary with the type of wood being cut and whether it is green or dry. The bowl gouge signals what kind of cut is being produced and whether the turner is close to getting a 'dig' or not. A spindle sets up its own vibration signal, depending on the work piece mass, diameter, and length between centers. A 'whipping' slender spindle turning can turn into a splintered projectile in an instant, following warning signs of chatter and other vibration. Finally, select good "sound" wood, that is, wood that is absent cracks, loose bark, ring shakes, etc., to avoid an unpleasant and potentially serious surprise projectile. Wear face protection at all times.

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EVENING PROGRAM - Pendants & Bangles

Stan Wellborn and Mike Colella Montgomery County Woodturners

President Tim Aley introduced our own MCW members Stan Wellborn and Mike Colella as the evening's program demonstrators. In keeping with the general thrust of "Making Holiday Gifts", Stan focused on making pendants using a commercial off-center jig, while Mike described and demonstrated his techniques for designing and making bangles and bracelets.

Making Pendants-

Stan described the use of the Joyner Off-Center Jig in making pendants. The jig is relatively inexpensive (~\$90), and is versatile in aiding unconventional turning of pendants, bottle stoppers, pens, and whatever the imagination permits. The jig is available from Ruth Niles (www.nilesbottlestoppers.com) For this discussion, Stan focused on pendant-making. For practice, he advised using scrap wood to start with, progressing towards exotics as skills are mastered. The jig is versatile and easy to use and skill is built rapidly. A pendant can be plain, plain with



inlay, incised with circular arcs, inset with stone or metal, etc. Stan estimated that in 'full production mode' a moderately decorated simple pendant can be made in about 5 minutes. Craft fair pricing seems to average about \$10-12/pendant, more if complex design and exotic wood combinations are employed.

The process begins with attaching and turning a rounded waste block to the indexing faceplate. Then, using a turning square of nice wood, turn it round, and then 'slice' off 3/8" thick disks for the pendant blanks with the band saw. A proper sled should be used in sawing the cylinder. These blanks are then mounted on the off-center jig to (1) turn the basic round disk to the desired shape, (2) reconfigure the jig to bore and chamfer a hole for a neck thong, (3) reconfigure to incise whatever 'carving' is desired, and (4) sand and finish the pendant.



The blank must be remounted during the process to machine and finish both surfaces. This is accomplished with pressure sensitive 'high tack' double faced tape to mount the blank on the aforementioned waste block. The waste block is attached to the jig's base plate which, in turn, is attached to the headstock with a MT bottle stopper mandrel onto which it is screwed. Details of this process are available in an instruction manual for making pendants, from Ruth Niles for \$5.00. (Note: videos of using the Joyner Off-Center Jig are accessible on the internet and YouTube, e.g.,

www.youtube.com and search for Eddie Castelin, #136 and #138.

There is also a video at $\underline{www.yoyospin.com/video}$. Scroll down and on the left are two selections: "Pendant I" and "Pendant II", both excellent for the beginner).

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The range of materials that can be used by the jig is considerable...virtually any material that can be worked with woodworking tools can be employed.

Stan demonstrated the basic use of the jig in centered and offcentered turning, describing techniques for profiling the edge, drilling and chamfering the lanyard hole and decorating and finishing the surfaces. He favors a foam-backed sanding pad for

quick and easy smoothing of the pendant.

For detailing off the lathe, Stan showed a universal hand pin vise as a work piece holder that is essential for securely holding a small item for detail work.

He concluded his portion of the program with comments on design, citing some available books on "Zentangle", a craft of pattern design and variation that serves as practice and inspiration for surface decoration.





Making Bangles-

Mike Colella described his practice and techniques in fashioning and making attractive wooden bangles of varying complexity. Mike adopts a "production," rather than a "hobby" approach, since he makes these bangles for sale at craft shows and similar sales outlets. The bangles he makes, both simple and complex, have sold well, for a range of prices from about \$10 to \$75 or so, depending on the woods used and the figure and design of the resulting bangle.

He starts with a solid square 4" or so block of wood of varying thickness. He finds that cherry and walnut work well, while more care must be used with some of the more spec-

tacular exotics because they tend to be brittle. Some woods are more toxic than others. For instance, cocobolo is known for contact allergic reactions. He has also experienced contact allergies from Danish oil. Personal protection (dust mask, clothing, face mask, etc.) is strongly advised.

The inside diameter of the bangle varies around 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ " +/- $\frac{1}{2}$ ", with additional allowances included for sanding/finishing. Mike uses a hole saw with the center drill removed to cut the inside hole for the bangle. The square solid block is mounted in a large jaw head-stock chuck, with the hole saw mounted in the tailstock. Limited by the depth of the hole





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saw, multiple bangles can be produced in a single block by cutting off the blanks at the desired width of the particular bangle. Mike generally cuts 20-30 at a time. From start to finish, it takes up to about an hour to produce a bangle.

Variations are limited only by one's imagination. The bangle can be simply of a single wood species, or it can be complex with inlays and laminations of contrasting woods to make it interesting, attractive and unique in pattern and appearance. Sandwiching or



laminating layers employs cross-grain assembly and gluing, to strengthen the bangle. When laminating different woods, one

should glue the block up first and after the glue has set, bore the hole, to ensure concentricity. Trying to glue up individual drilled blanks presents a lot of unnecessary problems.

Variations in the bangle can be accomplished, for example, by bandsawing a blank edgewise with a 'wavy' cut line.

A thin contrasting veneer is placed between the two wavy surfaces with glue applied and the assembly is clamped for a couple of days to ensure the curing of the glue.



Another variation is to glue contrasting woods around the perimeter of the square blank. Additional layers can add to the complexity and beauty of the piece. Once the glue has dried in these modified blanks, one can trim the corners on a bandsaw if desired.





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Mike designed a shop-built simple collet mandrel with three different diameters to accommodate different sized bangle blanks—2-3/8", 2-1/2", and 2-5/8". The blanks are slid onto the mandrel, which has a slight expansion mode, tightened by tailstock center movement, and then turned to the desired shape. Sanding and finishing of the outside of the bangle is done on the mandrel, and sanding the inside of the bangle is done off the lathe by hand, or using a cylindrical sanding drum.



Mike uses a water-base urethane or other non-toxic sealer for finishing, and on oily woods, a pre-wiping of acetone removes surface oils that would otherwise prevent adherence of the sealer.

Polished stainless steel inserts are also available to add interest and to also protect the wrist/arm from direct contact with the wood on the inside diameter of the bangle which, though somewhat costly, are nice and easily added to the bangle.





In closing, Mike pointed out that the 'holes' cut out of the blank make excellent pendant blanks.

Stan and Mike answered questions from the audience and were given a rousing round of applause for sharing their work with the club.

News about our Members (Phil Brown)

Upcoming Outreach Activities - by Phil Brown

Public Library Exhibits: I want to renew our display activities in county public libraries in 2014 with a different approach to borrowing turned work from you, our members. I would like you to lend one to four pieces for the entire calendar year. For me this means keying in the information for labels and lists only once, a big time saver when we have several exhibits in a year. Three dozen pieces are needed for two wall cases which most libraries have available for us. For narrow shelves, bowls must be 7½ inches or less in diameter or stand on their edge if larger. Much larger pieces look well in the wall cases with 12" or 18" wide shelves, found in a few libraries. Under this one-year lending/display program I hope to obtain 50 pieces.

Please select pieces to bring to our December 12th or January 9th meeting. An information sheet listing your pieces is in this newsletter and on the MCW web site. With 25 members lending an average of two turned pieces each, we will have a nice library of known work to draw from to commit for monthly displays. And all types of turnings are welcome - candle sticks, tree ornaments, wands, tool handles, bottle stoppers, balls, boxes, platters, bowls, and sculpture, etc.

Tudor Place, home of a Martha Washington grand daughter, is a historic site in Georgetown in NW DC (www.tudorplace.org).

After checking out wood saved from the tree, I decided to assist by cutting up a branch, bringing it and other cutoffs home, and also encouraged others from the three area AAW chapters to get involved. From wood taken to our meetings, many members took pieces to turn a bowl which they are willing to donate to Tudor Place. I hope that most of you who took the wood have turned a bowl, since a flitch is prone to crack if stored for long. I would like to collect your creations at the January, February, and March meetings. If your piece is not finished by March, they would still like to have it when available. Please sign the bottom legibly. The Director would like to give bowls to large donors and place some bowls in their gift shop.

Tudor Place is planning a "Tree Fest" on Saturday March 29th from 10 AM to 3 PM when they will plant another sizable white oak to replace the tree they lost. We will support the occasion with a wood turning demonstration using one of our mini lathes.
