
Member News (Phil Brown)



Last Month's Program (Gary Guenther)

For our November 10 Program, we invited Tim Moore, President of Chesapeake Woodturners, to show us how he makes miniature "birdhouse" ornaments. We thank Tim, and his wife Carol, for making the long trek over from the Eastern Shore, on our behalf.

I didn't take notes, so this is going to be primarily a photo essay. If you have any detailed questions for Tim, please email them to me, and I'll pass them on to him. Things are pretty self evident.

Tim brought some examples of his previous work to show us. Here, below, are some variations.

Each ornament, in general, has five turned pieces in it – the body, the roof, the floor with lower finial, the top bead, and the perch. In the following pages, you will see how he turns those. The



natural bark body for the one he made for us is, of course, not turned.




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If you're going to turn a body, do that first. Hollow it with a drill bit, cut it to length, and also drill the small "entry" and smaller perch holes. Next, do the roof. There are lots of possibilities. Tim chose a shingled style that includes both friction burning and pen burning.




Attach a small block of wood to a screw chuck, mount it in a scroll chuck, and turn the basic roof shape. For a shingled roof, mark divisions, turn each row proud, and burn the circumferential lines with a wire burner.




Dimple the top with a skew point and drill it, sized for a small tenon that will follow on a bead to come, with the bit held in a Jacobs chuck. Use a woodburner to add the lines separating the shingles.



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Voila; there you have your shingled roof. The roof can be glued on, or you could have turned a tenon on it to fit the top hole in the body. Chuck up another block. You could use a screw chuck again or a glue block, if you don't want to waste wood, or just turn a tenon on it for holding in your scroll chuck. Turn the bottom with some kind of finial. An acorn is nice – or you pick the shape. Measure carefully to cut a tenon on the "top" side to get a press fit into the bottom of the body cavity. Press or glue it in.



Hold another small piece of wood in a collet chuck (or by your favorite method) and turn a small bead on a tenon (sized to the hole drilled in your roof top) and drill it by hand with a tiny bit (sized for your screw-eye fastener,) after dimpling it with your skew point. Part off the drilled bead with its tenon and fit it into the hole you drilled in the point of the roof.

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Now we have four of the parts together.

The only thing left now is to turn the tiny perch using a collet chuck, or one of your choice. Don't forget to turn a "stop" on it at the proper distance you want for its length sticking out. Note that this "stop" is also decorative — not just functional. It makes the final product look much better. Part it off and very carefully insert into the tiny hole you have prepared in advance.

And there you have it – your five-piece natural-barkbodied birdhouse ornament with a shingled roof and an acorn finial.

Nice job, Tim. Thanks for showing us how you do it.

Let your imaginations run wild. There are infinitely many variations you can come up with for roofs and bodies and finials to create your own signature form.

Have fun with it.

That's a good thing to do too, but it's also why we wear our Face Shields! (He was.) I also saw a report of a grinder wheel exploding. That's why we wear our Face Shields at the grinder too! Do yourself a favor and spend a little more money to get a good, sturdy one.






CLICK IT – Web Site of the Month (Gary Guenther)
