Matt will talk about bowl turning basics, the tools he uses, finishes he uses and what makes a good bowl.

The annual critique session went very well. The panel had some nice things to say about almost every piece, but provided valuable insight as to potential improvements for most.





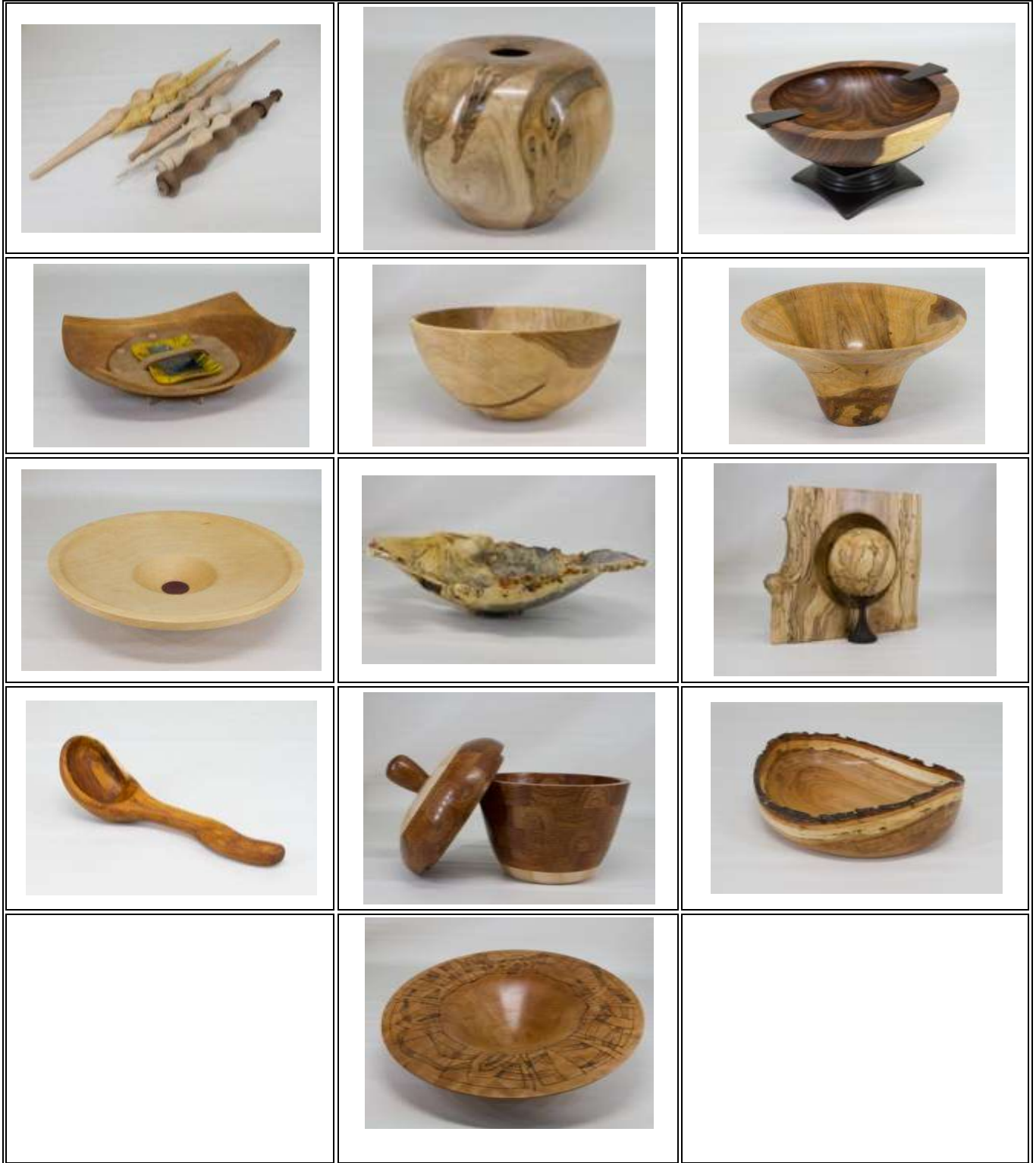

Phil Brown and David Fry will have pieces in a curated wood exhibition in the Popcorn Gallery, Glen Echo Park, February 11 to March 5, 2017. Gallery Hours are noon to 6 PM Saturdays and Sundays only. An opening reception will be from 3 – 5 PM on February 11th.

David Fry's review of the exhibition and book, *Shaping the Vessel: Mascoll + Samuel*, appeared in the October issue of *American Woodturner*, pages 33-35. David also had an article published on pages 46-47, *MARCUS REID GOES SOLO*.

Allan Starr displayed his car and truck creations in the free standing case at the Kensington Park library during January.

Manu Suarez was in Honduras last May to translate and help teach woodturning using a pedal-powered lathe in a project sponsored jointly by AAW's Turners Without Borders and Greenwood. American Craft Show, Baltimore 2017 will be at the Convention Center February 24: 10 a.m. – 8 p.m., February 25: 10 a.m. – 6 p.m., and February 26: 11 a.m. – 5 p.m. Approximately 9 wood turners are in the wood and turned wood categories, which you can view at <https://craftcouncil.org/artists/6901>. Under Filters on the right side, click "Select None", then click on the wood and turned wood categories, and click "Apply" to bring up pictures in those two categories.

Creative Crafts Council

Applications are open to February 20th to enter pieces for jurying into the CCC exhibit this spring, April 8 to May 21, at Strathmore Mansion. To submit pictures of your pieces, go to [creativitycraftscouncil.org//2017 biennial.html](http://creativecommons.org//2017%20biennial.html) before February 20th, the closing date. As a MCW member, you will pay the guild member rate, which is lower than for nonmembers. The site shows a calendar of events associated with the exhibition.

The CCC was formed over 50 years ago as a non-profit volunteer organization to create a local marketing opportunity for quality crafts in all media. While there is now a part-time administrator to handle much of the preparation work, a board of guild representatives meets to develop and approve plans, encourage guild member participation, and to recruit volunteers to help install the exhibition. We would like a few hours to a whole day of your time from April 3rd to 5th to help receive objects and install the work on pedestals and on the walls. If you are interested in selling your work, the setup experience is interesting and fun, and a chance to meet and network with other craft artists.

Tree Spirits

by Jane Frenke and Montgomery County Woodturners

Trees are the source of material for woodturners and of images for the quilts on display at the Bethesda Library from February 1 to 28.

Lathe turned wood bowls, hollow vessels, vases, and pens by Montgomery County Woodturner members highlight the color, growth and spalted patterns in wood from our local trees. The leaves and branches in Jane Frenke's quilts remind us of the source of the turned objects shown in the glass display cases.

Printing and dyeing fabric has always been a part of the creative process for Jane Frenke. The natural world ... trees, leaves and earth, inspire the imagery of her quilts. Jane's quilts have been



shown in many juried local, national, and international exhibitions. Her work has been shown through the Department of State Arts in Embassies Program, and is in collections around the world.

One common trait shared by members of the Montgomery County Woodturners, a local chapter of the American Association of Woodturners, is the passion to create beautifully turned objects, primarily from locally grown wood, much of which would otherwise be destined for a chipper or fireplace. MCW educates members through monthly meetings, a skill enhancement program, a newsletter, website, and email.

All are welcome to attend a reception with the exhibitors on Thursday, February 2 from 7pm to 8:30pm in the Bethesda Library.



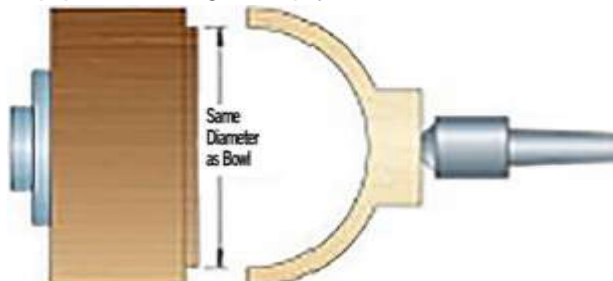

AAW - Items of Interest

SHOP TIP - Better Success with Jam-Chucking

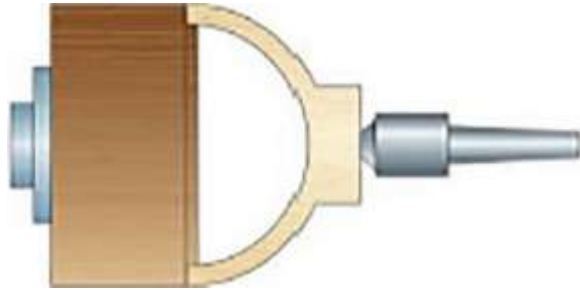


I've helped a few woodworkers who have had problems when turning with a jam chuck. This three-step process might help you be more successful.

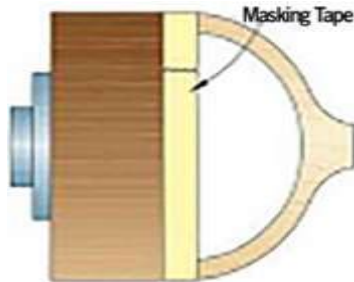




Step 1: Turn a jam chuck with a small tenon that fits inside the bowl. Turn the outside diameter of the jam chuck so the diameter matches the outside diameter of the bowl.



Step 2: Fit the bowl over the tenon and apply pressure with the tailstock. For added security and anti-slip protection, wrap the joint between the bowl and jam chuck with masking tape.



Step 3: With the foot turned, leave the masking tape in place but back off the tailstock. Slow the lathe speed and turn away the nub. When removing the nub, use light cuts that apply pressure toward the center of the form and toward the headstock. Then sand the bottom.
