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Dennis Fuge is a wood turner from Erwinna, PA, who has been turning for 50 years and spent time in South Africa, Hong Kong and the USA. Dennis has demonstrated at events up and down the East Coast; he teaches at the Peters Valley, Snow Farm,

and the Arrowmont Schools of Arts and Crafts. His main focus is on deep hollow vessels, platters, and artistic pieces. Some of his work will only use wood as a canvas, and he creates some very eye-catching pieces, using color, mixed media, and carving. Some of his most interesting work includes metals such as pewter, copper, and brass.

#### Deena and Jerry Kaplan Award of Excellence

Deena Kaplan, lover of wood art and long-time friend of the AAW, passed away on May 2, 2019. She is survived by her husband Jerry and their extended family. Deena was particularly fond of the AAW symposium Instant Gallery. She had a keen eye for excellence, purchased the work of many wood artists, and built an extraordinary collection.

Malcolm Zander says: "For over 20 years Deena was a fixture at AAW symposium auctions, buying work because she loved it but also because she wanted to support the artists. She enjoyed some memorable bidding battles. All who knew Deena comment on her unconditional generosity. Artist Ron Layport recalls, 'She was gracious and giving of her time, her home and her friendship.' Her smile and her enthusiasm for wood were infectious. Deena was a wonderful friend



and advocate for wood art. Her outgoing presence in the woodturning world will be sorely missed."

Tib Shaw of AAW says: "Deena and her husband Jerry were collectors of craft in many different mediums, but in a recent conversation Deena said that after Jerry started turning and she started collecting turned art, she felt like she'd truly found her community. She supported artists through her purchases, but also through her heartfelt interest in their work and lives—and that enthusiasm was contagious. Deena's smile and warmth could light up a room; she was an excellent ambassador for woodturning, and a model for living life joyfully."

Deena and Jerry have actively supported the AAW and woodturning throughout many years. In recognition of their many contributions and generosity, and in Deena's memory, the AAW Board has created the *Deena and Jerry Kaplan Award of Excellence*. This award was given at the Raleigh Symposium for a work of "exceptional originality, craftsmanship, and artistic quality," selected by the jurors of the Instant Gallery Excellence Awards from among the award winners in the Open Class. Each Excellence Award includes a special ribbon, a certificate, and a \$500.00 prize.

The Instant Gallery Awards is an annual AAW Professional Outreach Program (POP-) sponsored activity at the Symposium. This year, J. Paul Fennell, a member of the POP committee, was responsible for all of the Instant Gallery activities -- the Awards, the IG critique, and the Intimate critique. He selected the jury, who then went through the Instant Gallery and selected pieces for the Awards. This year's jurors were wood artist Betty Scarpino; Michael McMillan, curator at the Fuller Craft Museum in Massachusetts; Charlotte Wainwright, founding director at the Greg Museum in Raleigh; and collector Steve Keeble.

The winners of the 2019 *Deena and Jerry Kaplan Award of Excellence* are Pat and Karen Miller for their piece "Decorum". I know Deena would have loved this piece and probably would have bought it for herself.

Rules:

Maximum wood size 3bf total....no exceptions. Think 12x12x3.

Clean the lathe area so it is cleaner than when we started.

You must bring your own wood and your own tools.

Sanding and finishing can be done at home keep these to a min.

I will help people with blank prep a few times but after a few sessions you must do it yourself.

Safety gear must be worn at all times. Glasses and face shields.

If you bring cracked blanks/wood you will not be able to use it. Also there is no chainsaw so please keep that in mind when bringing round or wood without a flat surface.


### Turn for Troops - What's in it for me - (Roman Steichen)

It gets off to a slow, awkward start but becomes worthwhile after the first couple of minutes.

As John mentions at the end of the video, he is now on Instagram. I enjoy following him there and seeing almost daily examples of his work – old, new, and, particularly, in process.





#### **SAFETY FIRST** (Gary Guenther)

You know what they say about pictures being worth a lot of words... So let's keep this short and simple.

I was turning 11-year-dry osage orange today. A sharp gouge and proper cutting technique still led to nothing more than small bits and dust, not curls, as seen here. Nasty stuff. In case you're wondering, that's my footprints in front of my mobile lathe base on my concrete patio. Turning green wood is much more fun. But I digress...





#### The point is:

You don't want this wood up your nose, not all at once as a chunk, and not in the form of dust, so the simple three-word message is: "Wear your gear."

The proof of the pudding?

I had to clean the dust off the inside of my face shield after this! Be safe!

Bonus tip: The plastic wrap on the face shield is to provide a NASCAR-like "tear off" in case finish or CA glue gets on it, and to avoid scratches. The kitchen-grade film is cheap, adheres well, does not compromise vision, can be cleaned with a damp paper towel, and is easily replaced as needed. This piece has been on for a long time.

#### Jurying "Turning Wood into Art"

#### Barbara A. Wolanin

Phil Brown would have been very pleased to see the chapter organizing a show without him, along with quilts which he loved seeing shown with wood. I was honored that President Ellen Davis asked me to jury the pieces and pleased to see the quality and variety of work which made doing so a somewhat daunting task. I focused on the pieces I felt best fit the theme of the show, taking into account craftsmanship and aesthetic success.

Bob Grudeberg's large <u>Open Segmented Urn</u> (first prize) was clearly inspired by the classical vase form, with an artful patterning created by the light wood. The planning and precision and patience required for segmented work has always impressed me, and this piece more than holds its own in the show.

Ellen Davis pulled out the stops in <u>Double Chai</u> (second prize) with applied colors, metals, and burning, in addition to the wood, inset copper, eggshells, and a central stone, almost too much, but it is a piece that holds its own as a work of art and attracts the eye across the room. I interpreted the title to refer to spicy tea, while Ellen imbued it with symbolism related to the Hebrew word for life.

Stephen Price's <u>First Wings</u> (third prize) takes advantage of the natural edge and colors of his wood, made poetic by displaying it artfully as a relief, with the turned bowl the focal point.

Several other pieces were prize-worthy in their own ways. Jerry Kaplan exposed the natural sculpture of his *Big Leaf Maple Burl*. Tim Aley's beautifully shaped and finished bowl was made artful by being lifted on elegant feet. Allen Starr's <u>Backhoe Tractor</u> is an amazingly intricate and convincing construction, artful in his use of color. <u>Rhapsody in Magenta</u> by Jeff Struewing is a beautifully carved and painted gem. The show includes a wonderful range of approaches and talents.
























#### **Book Review (Ellen Davis)**







#### AAW Symposium Experience (Robert Anderson)

My time at the symposium began before the symposium, since I signed up to volunteer Thursday afternoon at the Volunteer Sign-in area. After a short inservice about our job there, three of us at the booth checked in volunteers, explained assignments, clarified expectations, coordinated lists and services, and found volunteer jobs for attendees who came by to ask what they could do. We were struck by both the generosity of the volunteers, who offered their time freely, and the extensive planning of the North Carolina symposium committee, a committee of individual clubs, who coordinated this national event. And I certainly was not




the only MCW member to volunteer; Mary Aronson and Jeff Struewing both volunteered in other capacities and received



When things got underway that evening, prior to the keynote address by Betty Scarpino and David Ellsworth, AAW president

Greg Schramek noted in his opening remarks that AAW and its local affiliate clubs (i.e., us) depend on volunteers to make them run. Dale Larson, who was honored with a lifetime membership in AAW, made similar points in his comments as he received his honor.





Volunteering was a great opportunity to help contribute to the conference by helping to ensure that folks were in place to help it run smoothly. In addition, it was a perfect way to meet a variety of turners, non-turning partners, and youth who were signing up for the various sessions just for them. It was a treat to see the energy of all of these folks, looking to learn and looking to help. It was also a great place to see various turning friends, some of whom I hadn't seen for a while, as they walked by towards registration or vendor areas. Part of being in a club is making personal connections, and the more you volunteer, the more you make.

As Greg Schramek and Dale Larson (and a variety of others) noted, all clubs, at both the

local and national levels, need volunteers to operate, and it's with this in mind that we hope that you will consider helping MCW. If you think of the range of folks who make it


