APRIL 9, 2020 Mike Colella ~ Photographing your work ONLINE Via ZOOM Meeting

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Welcome to the first MCW Virtual Meeting via Zoom. It's what separates us from animals, is our unique ability to adapt, and that's what we are doing in these difficult times. Im sure you've all heard it by now, how everyone is, Face-timing, Skyping, and Zooming each other as well as businesses. I'm sure there are a few of you (not yet retired) who have already experienced virtual meetings while working from home.

Well last week the MCW board did a trial run, using the

Zoom system and it worked quite well with 12 people. A few other clubs have already had successful virtual meetings with some of the pro turners



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with good outcomes. So at the meeting we decided to do a low budget trial by having the April meeting with Zoom. and to make it worthwhile to many I offered to do a demo on Photographing your work. I did one many years ago, but I felt it was worthy of repeating for many of the new members, and that there have been many advances in photography just in the past 10 years that I will shed some new 'light' on the subject. I will cover simple setups that anyone can do as well as lightly touching on the use of good SLR's and actual cell phones, which most all of us have.

Now to get to the meeting. I highly suggest, if you are not familiar with Zoom, to try it out with someone before Thursday, so you can be familiar with how it works. Unfortunately it will not be fair to others to stop the session, to help someone with a technical login, sound or video issues. I will volunteer to be available the day before the meeting, Wednesday evening from 6-8 in an open Zoom session for you to test it out. The links to both the Wednesday & Thursday session will be in the email which you will already have seen. So if you don't have anyone to test with log in WEDNESDAY evening to say hi for a few minutes to make sure you are up and running. You can do this with a laptop, desktop even an iPad and cell phone. Whatever device you use, It must have sound and video capabilities. Virtually all iPads and laptops and phones have that built in. Your desktop, should have some type of sound system, BUT may not have a built in camera, which would require you to purchase a inexpensive web cam. BUT don't rush out and try to buy one yet. You can still participate by simply watching and listening, (just like a YouTube video), we just won't be able to see YOU. For now that is not necessary, because you will want to be in full screen/ presenter mode and NOT in the 'Gallery" mode. And as far as web cams, they are as scarce as toilet paper right now. The earliest I could get one was mid May!

oh and there is no cost to this, you do not have to buy a subscription to anything. You will simply click on the link provided at the appropriate time AND enter the Password and you're in.

President's Perspective - Bob Anderson

First and foremost, the most important topic: we hope that you and your families remain healthy during this pandemic.

This is a difficult time in many ways for all of us. Personal, family and business lives have slowed significantly for most of us; every aspect of our lives has been impacted by this pandemic. Social distancing has left many feeling disconnected. While woodturning is often a solitary pursuit, usually an individual activity in home workshops, it is tempered for club members by many activities: skill enhancement, Wounded Warriors, shooting the breeze at the Woodworkers Club, selling at craft shows and markets, and our monthly club meetings. For the immediate future, though, all of these activities are on hold.

Clubs across the region and across the county are struggling with how to keep members involved when they can't come out to meetings. The camaraderie, the good-natured ribbings, the turnings we share, the knowledge from our friends and our demonstrators - all of this is part of our monthly get-togethers. Since our national health emergency has precluded many events, your MCW board has been meeting by conference call and Zoom videoconferencing to see how to maintain our collective enthusiasm for our craft and club.

The board had been considering trying remote demonstrations, presentations given through a videoconference by a turner in another location. They are two-way communications streamed to the club's facilities during a regular meeting. Mid-Maryland hosted one given by Trent Bosch earlier this year. Two MCW board members, Jeff Gilbert and I, who are also MMWTC members, saw the presentation and found it to be very good. In fact, it was well-received by everyone in attendance. While it didn't have the obvious benefits of our informal interaction with the demonstrator or passing around a demonstration piece, the presentation showed all of what we'd see in person; in most cases for our live demonstrators who would not normally travel to us to demonstrate and saves travel expenses for those

who would. It was fully interactive, with the demonstrator able to take questions and see the audience.

While we will probably pursue occasional remote demos after this pandemic has abated, at this time the club watch at the Woodworkers Club is not available. However, there is another option, a Zoom videoconference streamed directly to your personal computer at home.


Our board, with guests from Chesapeake Woodturners, tried this out from our individual homes. Mike Colella hosted (i.e., served as the demonstrator), and it went smoothly. We participants had different levels of tech skills, but we mostly found the Zoom platform to be relatively easy to negotiate. We learned basically as we went, and it is very easy to sign in. While it is clear that an online presentation streamed to your individual home is different from our usual social gathering, it is the only way at this time that we can get together.

To this end, we will hold our April 9 meeting. It will be via the Internet and streamed directly to you in your home. Mike Colella will be our host and will demonstrate the art of photographing your pieces. A video link will be emailed to all members, and all you have to do is click on it and follow the instructions to be joined into the demonstration. We also anticipate instructions for Zoom to be emailed to you from the club, but in the meantime there are some very good videos on the Zoom training resources website at https://zoom.us/docs/en-us/covid19.html.

We certainly hope that you will join our meeting on April 9. More information in an email will give you everything you need to log on to the conference. Stay well.

Juror's Remarks

I felt honored to be asked to select pieces for this multi-chapter exhibition of turned wood. While jurying from images, I was pleased to see the high quality and variety of the entries. All the artists are to be congratulated for their craftsmanship and creativity. Their pieces look impressive in person. Selecting some for prizes proved to be a challenge because there were so many I appreciated for fulfilling each turner's goal and style, which ranged from classic to sculptural or whimsical. I appreciated each one from my understanding of the artist's intention and judged them on the basis of craftsmanship and formal and aesthetic success.

In line with Caroline Kipp's decision for fiber awards, I have selected Juror's Awards and Honorable Mentions, and I could easily have included many more. I trust that being part of this fine exhibition, so artfully arranged by Gallery Director Anne Burton, is an honor it itself for everyone. It is good to see so many area chapters represented. The display appropriately pivots around the large fiber sculpture by George Lorio, itself made of wood, which of course includes plant fibers and connects the two parts of the show.

I was happy to see the collaborations with my late husband Phil Brown's roughed-out bowls on display with this show. He worked hard to propose and organize the last turned wood show here and showed work in other shows here as well. He loved the idea of collaborating with other artists and having his started bowls used for something new. His long-time goal of creating a totem sculpture out of bowls was finally fulfilled by his friends in his memory.



Skills Enhancement Schedule - Steve Haddix

Sunday skill enhancements will be held on odd months (1,3,5...), starting with January. We will meet from 10:00 to 1:00 on the Sundays following that month's demonstration, AS LONG AS we have at least four confirmed participants by the end of the demo evening. If we do not have 4 committed participants, a cancellation notice will be sent out to the club membership list, so please be sure that you keep your email address up-to-date.

As a reminder, Skills Enhancement is not designed to provide basic instructions to somebody brand new to turning, but it is a great way to continue developing the skills learned in a basic turning class. As always, safety is our first priority so the rules governing Skills Enhancement have not changed.

Skills Enhancement Rules:

- *Maximum wood size 3bf total....no exceptions. Think 12x12x3.
- *Clean the lathe area so it is cleaner than when we started.
- *You must bring your own wood and your own tools.
- *Sanding and finishing can be done at home keep these to a min.
- *We will help people with blank prep a few times but after a few sessions—you must do it yourself.

Safety gear must be worn at all times. Glasses and face shields.

If you bring cracked blanks/wood you will not be able to use it. Also there is no chainsaw so please keep that in mind when bringing round or wood without a flat surface.

Note - We are still seeking a Skills coordinator for Thursdays on even numbered months. This could be a great way for experienced turners who have benefitted from the club to pay it forward and help the next generation of turners keep the club thriving!





COVID-19 (Coronavirus)

Announcements

March 31, 2020:

Speaking on behalf of the Board and staff, we are humbled by the outpouring of support we have seen since announcing the cancellation of the AAW Symposium. I thank you for the patience and empathy you offered while the AAW went through the process of making this difficult decision.

While the financial outcome of the symposium cancellation remains uncertain, we are confident that any negative effects to the AAW organization will be manageable. The AAW Board provided strong leadership under difficult circumstances, working with experts who helped to guide us through the process. We are heartened by your offers of financial support. 


