

"The Terrible Skew"

Many turners - even some experienced ones -- remain fearful of using the skew in their work, or avoid using it in many applications where proper skew technique can yield better finished work with less effort than other methods. In this demo, Denis Delahanty will show



us different ways he uses the skew in a wide variety of woodturning situations, while illustrating how to avoid catches and other turning misfortunes. Denis will also discuss and demonstrate use of the different grinds he uses for his skews. Participants will leave the demo with greater confidence about how to introduce the skew into their everyday work.

Denis Delahanty bio:

For the fun of it, I signed up for a introductory woodturning class at Highland Hardware in Atlanta, Georgia, and was immediately bitten by the woodturning bug. I have since studied with many of the best known turners in the US and Europe including Jimmy Clewes, Nick Cook, Tom Wirsing, Nick Agar and Stewart Mortimer. I have also attended many of the American Association of Woodturners (AAW) International Symposiums where the best turners from across the globe demonstrate new techniques and styles.

As my skills advanced I have had the opportunity to demonstrate at club meetings and to teach full day workshops. My favorite topic is teaching how to turn with the dreaded woodturning skew. My favorite wood to turn is cherry. My favorite pieces to turn are small boxes, although I have turned many different pieces from three foot tall stools to pens and everything in between.





From 2013 through 2016, I served as a Board member for the American Association of Woodturners, a world wide organization serving fifteen thousand members and three hundred and fifty affiliated national and international chapters. This experience has given me the opportunity to meet and become friends with many woodturning enthusiasts and professionals. I now serve on two AAW committees and lead initiatives to better serve woodturning teachers and Art and Craft centers, encouraging them to

include woodturning in their curriculum.

When Nicki and I moved to Purcellville, VA in 2015, the property had a shell of a workshop in the backyard that we built out while renovating. Through the generosity

of a number of clubs and individuals, we have assembled a woodturning studio with nine full size lathes. Today, the studio is used by three local clubs for workshops. We host professionals for full day classes and monthly Skill Building Workshops on Saturdays. Please feel free to drop by to see the shop.

MCW February 2024 Meeting Notes

The February 8th meeting of the Montgomery County Woodturners (MCW) was called to order by President Joe Barnard at 6:37 pm with 19 people present, no guests or new members.

Dues are currently being collected by Treasurer Tim Aley. They are \$35 per member or \$45 per family. You may pay him by mail or through the club website with either a credit card or PayPal. If you cannot pay due to financial hardship, contact Steve Drake and your dues will be waived and membership will be renewed, no questions asked. While paying your dues, don't forget to pay \$10. for tonight's **demo fee**. Both may also be paid online or directly to Tim. Our website is https:// montgomerycountywoodturners.org/demo-fee/.

The **exhibition at the Museum for Art in Wood** in Philadelphia is starting in a couple of days. Phil Brown, and Alex Bradley both have work featured there. The exhibit runs from FEBRUARY 9 – SEPTEMBER 15, 2024

The **Annual AAW Symposium will be held in Portland Oregon** this year, May 23-26. While it is on the other side of the country, attending the symposium is well worth the trip. It gives club members the chance to experience woodturners from around the country and abroad. Thus far there are about five MCW members who hope to attend. If you are planning on going, you should know that the block of hotel rooms reserved at the venue are full, but other hotels in the city have accommodations.

The **Mid Atlantic Woodturning Symposium** will be held September 20-22, 2024 in Lancaster, Pennsylvania. The meeting has a good lineup of demonstrators, including Stuart Batty, Alan Lacer, Keith Gotschall, Carol Hall, Mark Hancock, and Greg Gallegos.

MCW has come to a consensus with the **Artists & Makers Studio** to put on an exhibition in their gallery in October of 2025. The exhibition of turned items will be alongside a group of quilts from members of the Friendship Star Quilters Guild. We will need enough turned work for a large room. On one Saturday during that month-long event, we will run a demonstration of turning, but the details have yet to be worked out.

Barnard reiterated that MCW has several activities ongoing as well as others down the road for which we need **volunteers**. We will need a group to help each month with our AV equipment, to set up the meeting room, and finally one to run the cameras as well as Zoom links for our meetings going forward. Rather than putting a rag-tag group together at the last minute, Barnard would appreciate volunteers to help us out <u>regularly</u> on this, as it is an integral part of the meetings.

Barnard said we will also be needing volunteers to help with the Artists & Makers Studio Exhibition to curate entries, to help with promotion, and to coordinate with the quilting group. He also wants to submit an application to Glen Echo Park for next year and maybe collaborate with Mid-Maryland or another group for an exhibition. So PLEASE STEP FORWARD AND VOLUNTEER if you are not currently doing so.

As is the case with most woodturning clubs, members like to sell their wares at various venues, but often other club members don't know where members are exhibiting their creations. In an effort to get members out to see your art and buy it, be certain to let Mike and Joe Barnard or

Joe Stout know where you will be exhibiting so they can put info in the *Turning Journal* or add info to the Public Library displays. As an example, Barnard said a few of us do the James Renwick Alliance Craft Day show, some do the Olney Craft Market, the Renwick Fair and some other craft markets. If you are planning to participate in any events, please let Mike and Joe know so that this can be published in the *Turning Journal* or at the library exhibits and you can get the support you deserve.

The current **MCW Library materials** are up to date, listed in the current *Turning Journal*, and available now. Please see the list and utilize this free-to-members resource. Questions can be answered by John Laffan.

President Barnard said he is confident that we now have enough pieces for our **public library displays** for this year. However, the display dates have changed: the Twinbrook library display will be in March; the Quince Orchard display will be in April; and the Bethesda (Connie Morella library) display will be in June. There will be more to follow.

The **Wounded Warriors** pen turning session in February will be held on the 16th, rather than the 5th as originally scheduled. If you plan on attending, be sure to get in touch with Don Van Ryk.

Turning for the Troops is ongoing. Members can always make pens for the troops on their own. Contact Roman or Chris at WWC to get kits. Amy notes that pens can be turned in to the Woodworkers Club through the end of the year, at which point they will get the pens shipped to our local USO office for dispersal.

Women in Turning has a new MCW representative, Dori Reissman. To get information about WIT you can contact Dori at <u>drdori7@gmail.com</u>

Beads of Courage is another ongoing project, coordinat whiched by Jeff Gilbert. He welcomes any vessels to hold these beads and is planning another trip to Baltimore to drop them off at Johns Hopkins.

President Barnard said that not only does MCW have a **Facebook** page members can visit (www.facebook.com/groups/194941367515051/), but it also has an Instagram site (Instagram.com/ mocowoodturners/?hl=en). He is hoping to get better pictures posted on it as the page has been dormant for some time.

Barnard also asked members to remember to support our hosts, the **Woodworkers' Club (WWC)**. He also reminded MCW members that the WWC is still looking for someone to teach an Introduction to the Lathe class. If you know of someone, he/she should contact Amy or Ralph.

The **Bring back Challenge** winner of last month, Eliot Feldman, presented this month's winner, Bill Bell, with a small, covered vessel. This was followed by **Show & Tell** during which nine members showed their creations, and then Roberto Ferrer **demonstrated** how to embellish one's work. (<u>www.ferrerstudioart.com</u>).


Beads Of Courage: Meet Harper

Members of the Prescott Area Woodturners (PAW) have been generous in donating hundreds of bowls to the Beads of Courage program over the years. Bowls made are currently being donated to Phoenix Children's Hospital (oncology) and Valleywise Medical Center (burn unit) in Phoenix as well as Duke University Hospital (oncology) in North Carolina. Recently, Harper Harrell received a bowl made by one of our members. <u>In this video</u>, she shares her story about having cancer and how Beads of Courage has encouraged her through her journey.

Hey, everyone. One of our members, Barbara Wolanin, who we know very well and has been on our critique panel, and a strong supporter of woodturning in Maryland. Barbara was Phil Brown's wife, and she asked me to inform the local area woodturning groups, (which obviously includes our members, of course. I'd never forget to send the info to US. I mean, of course you were my first priority). Anyway, there IS an upcoming exhibition at the Museum For Art in Wood in Philadelphia titled:

Phil Brown was a devoted woodturner and a community organizer who founded several woodturning chapters throughout his home state of Maryland. He also served on the Board of the Wood Turning Center, in later years shifting his role to coordinating the ITE residents' (now the Windgate Arts Residency Program – in Wood) annual tour through the private collections and sites in the DC area. Sadly, Brown passed away in July 2018. He left hundreds of partially turned bowls and blocks in his workshop that he wished to see realized. In this exhibition are presented bowls and sculpture initiated by Phil and finished by the residency alumni, in a laudatory act of collaboration with this influential and memorable artist.




The "Goshen Elm" (English Elm, (*Ulmus procera*), Maryland's only Millennium Tree), Gaithersburg

The Goshen Elm in Gaithersburg was likely brought from England in the mid-1700s, and has inspired a huge community base of support to stop road encroachment that threatened its root system with development. Montgomery Parks Department acquired the land around the tree, naming it a conservation park in 2001, and Pepco has recently moved its power lines to the opposite side of Goshen Road in an effort to preserve the Goshen Elm's beautiful canopy.

Originally thought to be a Rock Elm (hence the name of the intersecting road, "Rock Elm Road"), then a European Elm, its species was definitely confirmed as English Elm *(Ulmus procera)*, and recent communication with Mr. Peter Bourne, the founding member of the UK Tree Register who maintains the Ulmus database, confirmed that it is the largest known English elm in the world! The second largest known English Elm in the world is, in fact, in Brighton, England.




