President's Perspective - Joe Barnard

I was expecting to have very little to say here at the first of July. Basically, we had planned the picnic on July 14th at Mike Colella's house, the Montgomery County Fair August 9-17th, and coming in September, everyone's favorite, the MCW critique. None of which I have much to do with other than going to the fair and turning for a few hours. Instead, there's a lot of other stuff going on as well as this stuff. Only part of that is partly my fault.

To begin with, you may recall the May demonstration by Paul Paukstelis. Paul rather generously offered to show his newly designed and constructed Lathe Engraver, which, among other things, allows an attached router to cut recesses for placing butterflies, aka pewa, along a crack on a bowl to stabilize the piece. He ran out of time, and was unable to demonstrate on any of the members' pieces. Immediately afterward, Paul told me that he'd still like to do so, and talked about getting the Woodcraft classroom on another date to do so. Seeing this as something we could do as a club outside our usual demonstrations, and happening to have a piece or 2 that could use such a treatment, I immediately worked with Paul to make it happen. As we have a regular reservation of that classroom at Woodcraft, it was easy to arrange to get the room for our regular time and regular night in July. As it happens, we aren't having a regular meeting in July anyway, so it was a win for everyone. Accordingly, this coming week, on July 11th, between 4:30 and 9 pm, we will have the classroom: it will not be set up at the start, so don't expect to just walk in with your bowl under your arm at 4:30 and plug right in. As of today, July 3, we have 10 members coming, some of who are just coming to watch, and some who will have bowls to adapt. There is much more detail in the invitation that I sent out last week, so you might want to reread it to make your plans. I'll add that if you are bringing something, you can make it much easier and faster by doing a couple of things. First, make a list of the pewa you want to add. Mark where on the bowl each goes, and get a good estimate of the diameter or circumference of the bowl at that point, and at the top of the bowl and write that down for each recess. Finally, decide the angle the pewa needs to be cut at. This is all spelled out in the linked PDF:

If you're unable to get this done ahead of time, don't let that stop you from coming, it is still possible to do that on-site.

of what to expect. I'd especially like for all to pass their appreciation on to Paul for this opportunity.

We did submit our application to Glen Echo for an exhibition in collaboration with both Mid-Maryland Wood Turners Club and Friendship Star Quilters for some time next year. They will let us know by July 31st, so next month we will know.

On July 14th, we will have our yearly picnic at the Colellas' house, as Mike will have sent invites to all already, and detailed elsewhere in the Journal. Please, everyone, make an effort to come- Mike certainly is making a big effort to host us each year, and it really will be a good time. One event going on at the picnic will be the raffle for a \$50 gift card to the Woodworkers' Club for one of the members who has brought a Beads of Courage Bowl. Jeff Gilbert will award the prize and show us all the bowls our club members have brought.

In August, we will have our extended demonstration series at the Montgomery County Fair. You should have gotten email(s) from Tim Aley asking you to sign up for a period of turning at the fair. It is a lot of fun, and worth the time. Also at the fair you could win some money and some recognition for your turnings as there are a host of awards that you might win, which include small amounts of cash. There are about 6 or 7 categories you can enter turnings in as detailed in Tim's email. This is pieces you've turned and entered, not pieces turned during the fair.

Also in August we will have a really fascinating demonstration by the very highly respected and not-quite-local woodturner Mike Sorge. Bill Bell, our Program Director really went to work on getting this organized with all 3 clubs. Not only will Mike demonstrate for us, on our regular night but also at Mid-Maryland Woodturning Club and will be running 2 local workshops hosted by MMWTC and CAT. While details of the workshops haven't been completely worked out, our members will most likely also be able to participate in one of those 2 workshops over at Denis Delehanty's workshop in the Catoctin area. As we get closer to those dates, we will provide the salient details. If you cannot make our meeting, you can still see Mike demo at MMWTC the night before. This was not an easy thing to organize, and Bill really did a great job for all 3 groups. That's July, I'll see all of you at the Colellas' house on the 14th!

The Basics...

The fair is open from Friday Aug 9 - Saturday Aug 17. We will set up on the 9th, Turn and talk to the public on the 10th-17th and clean up Sunday Morning Aug 18. We like to have 2 members turning all shifts Saturday to Saturday. I and/or John Laffan will be there everyday to help, answer questions, and have supplies.

Here is a link to the sign up sheet for your slot. The sooner you sign up the sooner I will know how many tickets to get. <u>MCW Fair 2024</u> There are 2 slots for each shift. Questions? Contact me.

We will have 2 midi lathes to turn on. You may bring your own project or use wood we will have there, we just ask that no woods that may cause allergic reactions/ irritations (including walnut, most exotics, aromatic red CEDAR) to keep everyone safe. You may bring your own tools but you may have to carry them some distance. We will have some tools and a grinder there.

You will get **free tickets** to get in and may use the rest of the time to explore the fair. Most do **NOT have parking included** but they have free parking..

Old Timers Section

We get our free tickets through the Old Timers section that included the items in the building near us and the blacksmiths. The Oldtmers section has exhibits from years gone by (at least 50 years old....damn, I'm officially an oldtimer) including the inside exhibits: general store, country kitchen, tools, printing press and a player piano. The outside exhibits are the tractors, small gas engines, blacksmiths and us. All of the oldtimers section needs to be set up every year. They need help setting it up. If you would be interested in helping, the oldtimers only date is July 13. This day is mostly moving items from one building to the other. (this is the day John and I usually attend and then maybe other work days) Then the next 3 Saturdays are work days for the whole fair. If you get there between 8am and 9am you can get lunch.. The first day is pizza with the old timers and the other days are catered in air conditioning. You also get hours toward the lifetime membership. Please ask me or John if you have any questions.

The June 6, 2024 meeting of the Montgomery County Woodturners (MCW) was called to order by President Joe Barnard at 5:34 pm. Present were 21 members and one guest, Steven Barnard.

President Barnard reminded those present that there is a **fee of \$5 for tonight's demonstration** which may be paid to club treasurer, Tim Aley.

With the 2024 American Association of Woodturners (AAW) Symposium finished, Bernard said that the 2025 American Association of Woodturners (AAW) Symposium will be held next year in St. Paul, MN, June 12-15.

Barnard announced that yesterday he turned in an **application for an exhibition at Glen Echo Park for next year**. It will be a collaborative effort with Mid-Maryland, Friendship Star Quilters and MCW. He thanked all those who help with the application, in particular Mike Colella, Dave Swiger and Tom Lesser of Mid Maryland who helped with the photos and Gary Guenther who assisted with the text.

In August we will have an extended demonstration series at the Montgomery County Fair. Joe said it's a lot of fun. Tim said that so far Roman has signed up for it.

Barnard announced once again that MCW's annual picnic/ice cream social is coming up on July 14 at Mike Colella's home in Laytonsville encouraged everyone to come. Mike puts a lot of effort into the event and if at least ten people don't sign up, it will be cancelled. Mike will be sending out an RSVP, and a response to it will be due on the Tuesday of the week of July 14.

Jeff Gilbert reminded those present tonight that there will be an added impetus to attend: he is encouraging MCW members to work on bowls for **Beads of Courage**. For each bowl a member makes, he/she will receive a raffle ticket and then at the picnic there will be a drawing to determine the winner. The prize will be a \$50 gift certificate which can be used at Woodcraft.

Joe thanked those who have signed up to **volunteer** for the club in various capacities. But he reminded those who have not to please do so as we will be needing more help in the future. And he is especially hoping to get some of our newer and younger members involved.

The **Public Library Displays** are going on now. Currently there is a display at the Connie Morella Library in Bethesda, which he encouraged those present to visit. He noted that the display is nicely set up (not too crowded) but added that the exhibit will end June 20. Following it, the next Public Library Exhibit display will be in at the Potomac Library in August.

Gary Guenther announced that in lieu of the September meeting, MCW will have its **annual juried event** during the September meeting. Those participating as judges will be Alex Alexopulos and Lisa Battle. The third juror has not yet been determined.

Joe Stout has taken over the **Wounded Warriors** project. He said they met last Friday and that tomorrow five people were scheduled to attend. He said that more volunteers are needed to help.

Turning for the Troops is ongoing. Members are encouraged to turn on their own. Those who do, can get kits from either Roman or Chris at the Wood Workers Club (WWC). Finished Pens can be turned in to WWC through the end of the year. Joe turned in 20 pens recently.

We are still without a representative for **Women in Turning** (WIT). Any one can volunteer, it need not be a woman.

Joe reminded those present to support the WWC – our landlords for these monthly meetings. By support he means that if you are in need of tools or other provisions for your turning, consider getting them at WoodCraft.

Eliot Feldman, last month's Bring Back Challenge winner, drew Tim Aley's name as this month's winner.

The MCW business meeting ended at 6:15 pm.
