We're in for a treat, as the demonstrator for our August 8 meeting will be Mike Sorge. Those with a long memory will recall Mike's previous visits to our club. Mike is a nationally known turner whose work is displayed in top galleries across the country, and I think it's fair to say that his pieces are unlike any others.

Mike will be demonstrating how he creates his Trillium box. (See picture below.) The base of the project is a three fingered (petal) blank that will resemble an undulating trillium flower when complete. The technique to achieve a successful final form involves "turning air" at a high RPM. Mike will show us how he gets it done safely and efficiently.

Mike's uniquely prolific "big air" sculptural creativity specializes in large "winged" turned art forms. The uplifting, positive aesthetic nature throughout Mike's body of work (Blossom Sculptures

and Vessels, Manta Ray Boxes, Spirit Birds, Trillium Floral Boxes, Triple Diamond Pagodas, etc.) is inspired by his ongoing studies of worldwide



cultural wisdom, ancient and contemporary. Mike considers his inspirational studies no less important than his time in the studio, which has led Mike to understand the solution to all of humanity's problems will only be achieved through, if simply stated in two words, "virtuous freedom". The pendulum of individual excellence (virtuous acquisition) keeps the scales of understanding in righteous balance.

Mike has provided professional demonstrations and classes around the country and enjoys encouraging others to explore, experience and evolve their skillful endeavors, to dream more, learn more, do more and become more as woodturning artists. "Learn the rules like a pro so you can break them like an artist." ~ Pablo Picasso. The various art show and exhibition awards Mike has received are nice, but his true delight is in creating inspiring work. "I believe in the illimitable and inimitable positive potential within each of us and enjoy encouraging and inspiring others through my efforts."

President's Perspective - Joe Barnard

Welcome to August in Maryland, heat index will be 101°F today! -still, October is coming, and with it, the Woodcraft Octoberfest.

First up, I have a question for members. Do you ever have trouble getting transportation to the meetings? I received a somewhat wistful email from a member, who hasn't been to any meetings in some time, and it got me to wondering about why we haven't pursued the possibility of letting members know that any number of us who do regularly attend could easily stop by and give others a ride. I don't have a mechanism set up yet, which is why I'm asking the question, but those of you who do come, consider how easy it could be to stop by and pick up one of our members who doesn't have the transport available. Feel free to send me an email as well.

In early July we had our 'workshop' with Paul Paukstelis and his Lathe Engraver. There were around 11 members who came, and a good time was had by all. You can see my completed piece here, and I can tell you the process was pretty easy, and did a terrific job. Only one piece was





damaged by an oversight in the process, but with experience that sort of issue should not come up.

A few days later we had our annual club picnic at the Colella's home, which will be described with pictures and commentary by our host elsewhere in The Journal. Suffice it to say we all had a great time. Congratulations to Duane Schmidt, who won the \$50 gift certificate for members who had made and donated bowls for the Beads of Courage project. We will do the BoC event again.

Coming up next week will be our August Meeting, August 8th, with Mike Sorge, the very highly respected and not-quite-local woodturner giving us a really fascinating demonstration of making his trillium box. The base of the project is a three fingered (petal) blank that will resemble an undulating trillium flower when complete. The technique to achieve a successful final form involves "turning air" at a high RPM. Mike will show us how he gets it done safely and efficiently. The demonstration will

take place at the usual place and time (business meeting starting at 6:30; demo starting around 7:00 - 7:15.) Watch your emails for a Zoom link if you can't make the meeting.

Bill Bell, our Program Director, really went to work on getting this organized with 3 local clubs. Not only will Mike demonstrate for us, on our regular night but also at Mid-Maryland Woodturning Club and will be running 2 local workshops hosted by MMWTC and CAT. Our members will be able to participate in one of those 2 workshops over at Denis Delehanty's workshop in the Catoctin area. You should have gotten an email from Bill explaining how to sign up for one of the workshops. In addition, if you cannot make our meeting, you can still see Mike demo at MMWTC the night before. This was not an easy thing to organize, and Bill really did a great job for all 3 groups. I truly doubt this would have happened without Bill's hard work.

On August 7th and 8th we will have the opportunity to submit our work for display at the Montgomery County Fair (in the Arts and Crafts section), with a chance of winning some money, easily enough money to buy a candy bar or a soda. If you are already going to take part in our demonstrations at the Montgomery County Fair August 9-17th, you might as well come in a day before and submit some work for display. The display area is right beside our big canopy we share with the Montgomery County Carvers during the fair, so you will have free time between turning periods to see how you did and how everyone else did on awards. Believe me, we all will get some sort of ribbons. Here is the catalog so you can have some idea as to what categories your work will fit into.

Starting on August 9, our stint at the fair begins with a couple of hours of setting up the turning

area along with the pole lathe and the carvers beside us. We have morning and afternoon turning slots each day, and you can sign up on Tim's worksheet https://docs.google.com/spreadsheets/d/197r90OQakjAtAw-

Signing up helps Tim to make sure he has enough tickets for everyone, and the tickets are likely to be available at the meeting Thursday, so if you have yet to pick a session, sign up anyway, so that there's a ticket for you. You can figure out when is best to come later, but not too much later.

Coming in September, will be everyone's favorite, the MCW critique. Soon Gary will be asking people to sign up for a slot to be critiqued, and I highly recommend taking part. The 3 panel members will examine our work, and give honest, valuable critiques of what we've done. It is also interesting, and an opportunity to show some work you may be experimenting on, something you think is outstanding, and in addition, they will answer whatever question you may have that you might be unsure about. If you have no question, don't worry, just bring a piece in anyway. There will be some valuable learning going on regardless.

We did submit our application to Glen Echo for an exhibition in collaboration with both Mid-Maryland Wood Turners Club and Friendship Star Quilters for some time next year. They will / have NOT let us know our status yet, so maybe by the meeting on the 8th we will know.
