Turning and embellishing a Platter

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Thanks to our Contributors : Joe Barnard Tim Aley Gary Guenther



In this demonstration we will be using a technique used by Tom Wirsing. This technique uses a face plate to create a stable uniform piece. As part of the demonstration we will see Jimmy Clewes's method for turning an ogee on the bottom of the platter. Once we have finished the completed platter we will explore 4 ways to embellish the rim. The first is a burning technique that highlights the grain and allows

decoration with burnishing/liming cremes. The second technique is a double dying technique. The third technique uses gesso and carving. The final technique involves cutting, carving and shaping.

Tom Huber from CAW last demonstrated for us in Feb. 2019 when he showed us some kitchen gear – a cookie/biscuit cutter and a spurtle. Believe it or not, that's now six years ago. Seems like yesterday. https://photos.app.goo.gl/Ae6iDRoKRvDs2S2A7

More recently, you may remember Tom as one of our Critique panelists from last September, where he did an outstanding job – and he will be joining us again this year in that role.

Tom Huber, a long-time member of CAW, started off as a child in Southern California. As a Navy brat he traveled the country to his dad's various duty stations. Eventually, he landed in San Diego where he finished High School and attended the University of California San Diego in the 1960's when he wasn't surfing or making surfboards. After a brief stint studying Medieval History in a Master's Program he spent several years kicking around in odd jobs until he joined the U.S. Air Force. The Air Force was very good to him, and he retired as a Lt Colonel, after working at every level from base to the Pentagon. The Air Force sent him off to distant lands and he spent 14 years of a 23 year career outside the United States in Germany, Turkey, and England. He has been married to his wife Lt Colonel (ret) "Charlie" Brown for 40 years. They have lived in Northern Virginia since 1996. After he retired from the Air Force, Tom taught elementary school for several years and discovered woodturning in 2005.

Like many turners, Tom started off turning pens for friends and family. After taking a bowl turning class at Woodcraft, he joined Capital Area Woodturners and the American Association of Woodturners in 1996. He took advantage of CAW's Skill Enhancement Workshop program and was mentored by very talented local turners. After becoming more confident in his skills he began to take workshops from CAW's visiting artists including David Ellsworth, Mark St. Leger, Barbara Dill, Jimmy Clewes, Stuart Batty, Rudy Lopez, Mark Sfirri, and Jacques Vesery. For a long time, Tom was a "lurker" -- content to remain in the background, attend CAW monthly meetings, and take the occasional class. After a while he realized how much CAW had given him. He was part of a long established craft, he had a creative outlet, and he was in contact with others who shared his enthusiasm. As a result, he volunteered to become the CAW Program Manager and Newsletter editor in 2016. In this capacity, Tom has had the ability to explore the craft of woodturning by bringing in artists who span the diverse range of the craft. In addition he has written articles for the newsletter that explore various elements of the craft, as well as information about design, wood composition, and the various timbers used by woodturners. Tom has also trucked many demonstrators to MCW.

Like most practitioners of woodturning, Tom is a hobbyist turner. His only advantage is that he is fully retired and can spend as much time as his wife will allow him on his passion. As a result, Tom has a wide range of interests ranging from spindle turning, bowl turning, hollow forms, and off-center turning. Tom likes to turn items that have a purpose and isn't normally interested in doing art for art's sake. He believes embellishing a piece can elevate it and make it more interesting, but he rarely makes "art" pieces.

For MCW, Tom will show us his latest take on platters. You don't want to miss this one!




Processing Milled Walnut boards for Use in Urns

All of us who knew Jack Enders respected him greatly. He was a very special person, and we miss him.

Gary Guenther was contacted by Jack's nephew, Eric Janson, who lives in Colorado, for help with some large (7' long), milled, walnut boards that Jack had saved in an old barn in Ohio. The timber was in MD, and Eric needed to fly here to process the wood for transport back to Colorado, as airline "luggage"!

Eric is a talented woodworker, and he is going to craft a pair of urns (boxes), from Jack's walnut boards, to hold the ashes of Jack, and eventually his widow, in a mausoleum at Arlington National Cemetery.



Eric needed a shop in MD, and Woodcraft was no longer available for such work, so he emailed Gary. Yes, Gary knew the perfect shop -- that of our fellow member Steve Haddix, who was a furniture maker before he got pulled into the vortex by his twin brother. Steve has the skills and maintains a full workshop with all the needed tools, and he was more than happy to help Eric with his quest. Eric brought the boards to Steve's shop, and Steve first used a chopsaw to cut them into 3-foot lengths. Then they went into the jointer for a little edge work; then to the table saw for width; then back to the jointer for some rough surface work, and the planer for final sizing. Wrapping the dimensional lumber securely in cardboard into 50# bundles for trip home on United was the final step.





Lisa Battle Raku Firing (by Gary Guenther)

Lisa Battle, a local ceramic artist, was one of our Critic Panelists last September, when she generously shared her time and energy and artistic inspiration with us. She contacted me recently because she is aware of our ability to produce prodigious piles of wood shavings. She is a participating member of the Washington Ceramic Guild, which, itself, is also a guild of the Creative Crafts Council, as is MCW. She and other members of the WCG were planning a raku firing and needed bags of wood chips and sawdust to put into metal trashcans to burn and create the smoke and residue that decorates the surfaces of the kiln-hot ceramic items placed inside. She recognized that's something we might have as a byproduct of our turning, and she would be happy to come by and collect them. I forwarded her request to MCW members, and five of you kindly volunteered their stores of curls and cutoffs prior to recycling. Thanks to Rick Ellsbury, Jeff Struewing, Tim Aley, Paul Paukstelis, and Jeff Cooper, Lisa was able to collect even more bags than she had hoped for.



Lisa was pleased to meet our "wonderful woodturners" and encouraged by how we are willing to help fellow artists. She reported that she and her friends made very good use of the bags full to fire their ceramic pieces in the raku style. Both the "flame" piece, and the "river" piece (my descriptors, not hers) are Lisa's; the former is one of her signature styles. I love the way it came out with the banding effect. And the textures on the latter are amazing. (These pieces will be "cleaned up" before they are finished.)

Lisa's next show is coming soon -- she will be one of a small group of sculptors in the 44th Annual Invitational Sculpture Exhibition at the Montpelier Arts Center in Laurel. https://www.pgparks.com/event_list/the-44th-annual-invitational-sculpture-exhibition
It runs from June 13 to July 27. I certainly intend to get over there to see that.

Lisa is also a member of Montgomery Potters and was a part of their recent, excellent show at the Gaithersburg Arts Barn.
