Simon Begg, a full time wood turner and carver from Australia. I have been turning as a career for over 9 years after completing my apprenticeship in cabinetmaking. My work has a huge variety in what I get to make.



Some weeks its salad bowl, natural edge burls or bowls with carved embellishment. Commission jobs that are smaller runs of product or unique jobs that have more problem solving to them. Chainsaw carving which I fell into by chance. The best days are where I get to be more creative with hollow forms and the German ring turning.

The German ring turning is a 200 year old process which was designed for the production of toys. There are still very few people that use this method traditionally as a folk art in Germany but I have now come at it with a different approach. I started the ring turning as a test of skill and tool control. Things have greatly developed from there as I continued to push the boundaries of design and my abilities. As well as going over a unique process, this demos main focus is tool control and planning which means it is suitable for all skill levels.

The Fair Explained

It is the Montgomery County Agricultural fair https://mcagfair.com/ at the fairgrounds in Gaithersburg.

Every year we set up at the fair in the Oldtimers section across from the blacksmiths at the top of the hill. We get free tickets to the fair from the old timers section. so you can enjoy the rest of the fair if you want the rest of the day. Map is attached.

We have 2 lathes and turn all day trying to get more members and promote woodturning... We have 2 midi lathes so we don't turn large items, just things to have fun with... Some people bring projects (no walnut, cedar or exotics) and I have some bowl and spindle blanks for anyone to turn. I will also have some of my tools there that everyone is welcome to use... or you can bring a few of your favorite tools, they let them through the metal detectors, just say "i'm turning with the woodturners"...

We will also have a pole lathe setup if you want to get a workout:)

John Laffan and I are there almost the whole time for guidance, and finding things (we try to bring everything)... if I don't get the lathes filled, I turn, otherwise I pole lathe and carve (we share the booth with the carvers) I have 2 shifts setup but am very flexible in coming and going. There is free parking at Montgomery College in Rockville and Germantown. The bus lets you off near our spot. (there is a shuttle from the perry parkway paid parking that ends up at the same place.)

Entries are open to all residents of Montgomery County and lifetime members. All exhibits must remain in the building until release on Sunday, Aug. 18, at 1pm. Removal of items before this date will result in forfeiture of premiums and ribbons, and exhibitor will no longer be allowed to exhibit in this Department. Entries can only be picked up at this time or they become the property of the Fair. Registration is made simpler by presenting a slip with your name and address plainly printed when entering. Small gummed labels or rubber stamps are time saving in filling out tags. 4. 5. 6. All entries must be the work of the exhibitor; must have been COMPLETED WITHIN THE FAIR YEAR; must be clean, in good condition and in good taste. Exhibits not conforming to the specifications of its class will not be judged.

NO POLITICAL SATIRE PIECES WILL BE ACCEPTED.

The Superintendent reserves the right to refuse any objectionable exhibit.

NO "For Sale" signs or other promotional material is to be placed on or with any exhibit in this Department.

No entry exhibited previously at the Fair will be eligible for competition, except in the case of collections.

THERE CAN BE ONLY ONE ITEM PER CLASS. For example, only one entry each in oil landscape, waterscape, etc.

381. Novelty wood craft (carving, inlay, etc.).

September 11, 2025 – 16th-annual Panel Critique

The Show Tell & Ask Panel Critique event has been a big hit for 15 years, and we are happy to continue this MCW tradition in 2025. Instead of a demonstration, we will have an extended Show Tell & Ask period with a critique of each piece by a panel of three selected craft, art, and woodturning experts. Our goal is to get fresh perspectives, from the outside looking in, at what we're doing, how our forms relate to those of other media, and how we may be able to improve them. "Design" is one of our keys here. What do our pieces look like, and why? What can we do to make them better or more interesting? We will all learn about design, turning, decorating, and finishing techniques from seeing the feedback provided to sixteen members who will bring their pieces in for meaningful feedback. This is an ideal way for us all to discover how to improve what we are doing in a fun, friendly, but knowledgeable and informative environment. Comments from the audience will be welcomed, as time permits. We intend to keep it informal and to just have fun with it, as we always do.







Panel members this year are well known to you. Woodturner Tom Huber will be reprising the great job he did for us last year. Art historian, and Curator Emerita for the

Architect of the U.S. Capitol, Barbara Wolanin will be joining us for her fourth time. Experienced ceramic artist and teacher Natalia Kormaluk will be with us for the second time. We all thank them for providing their time and energy and insights for us. There are always lots of smiles but also meaningful commentary about the presented works, because constructive criticism is how we learn to move forward to make "the next piece".


The September meeting will begin with a brief business meeting, as usual, including the Bring-back Challenge, but there is no separate ST&A – this Program is it.


Please mark your calendars now, and let's have a good turnout for this always interesting and entertaining program.
