## President's Perspective - Joe Barnard

Hello MCW!

We are about to wrap up the year 2025. This year we restarted our Skills Enhancement program with a lot of support from our great hosts, the Woodworkers Club. Several members went to Minnesota for the AAW International Symposium, which was a great time. This June it will be in Raleigh, North Carolina, a MUCH closer venue. We might get a much larger number to attend? We had a great picnic this July, hosted by Mike Colella's family, and it too was a great time. Tim Aley coordinated our week-plus long demonstration at the Montgomery County Fair, and of course Gary Guenther brought to life our yearly critique.

This month, obviously, is our yearly holiday potluck dinner and meeting. I like to think of our yearly holiday party as an opportunity to have a fantastic tapas experience. Something that kind of fell by the wayside in recent years that I want to make clear is that your significant others are of course encouraged to attend. I know how riveting a holiday party all about woodturning can be, so don't push back when your nearest and dearest start asking you, probably as soon as this weekend "can I come? I've heard from you and from Instagram and ALL the social media that this is THE event of the year! I scoff at the Met Gala!" Of course they can come! Everyone is welcome.

Ideally, we will all bring something different, something delicious, maybe something the rest of us have never had before. The club will provide soft drinks, cutlery, cups, plates, napkins, etc. Oh, we can warm things in the WWC microwave if needed. If you can, let Bill Bell know what you're bringing as soon as you can. If you forgot and are reading this on Thursday morning or afternoon (of the 11th), bring whatever's closest, if it's edible, and come anyway. We'll have a good time.

**I hope to see *everyone* on Thursday, December 11th by 6:00 pm:** earlier if you're helping set up or you need to orchestrate a beef Wellington. or pop some microwave popcorn. or tear open a bag of Old Bay flavored chips.

I know I earlier spread the rumor that it was to start at 6:30, but considering the possible speech lengths we may have during the Show, Tell, Bloviante, Tell, Expound, Tell and Ask sessions, the **6:00 early start** may turn out to be quite prudent. Once the eating is winding down, we do have a bit of business to take care of. According to our bylaws, we have yearly elections to pick out our officers for the coming year. As of today, December 3<sup>rd</sup>, we only have incumbent officers running for office. There's still time for new officers to step up- just let me know and we'll put you on the ballot. Depending on last month's winner, we may also have a bringback challenge to award.

Also, of course, it's time to pay dues. Tim Aley will be there collecting money and giving out the receipts that he will be giving you because you are present at the meeting paying your dues. Of course, you can also take a seat, log onto the website and pay your dues that way without the long line waiting for Tim's handwritten receipt- rumors of him using calligraphy are greatly exaggerated.

Unlike most of our meetings, the interactive part is much more extensive and inclusive. First up will be the long-form Show, Tell, and Ask Session. The same is true of any tips you might have, or anything you've found yourself doing that you suddenly realized one day was original that nobody taught you, or something you saw on a you-tube video that you've never seen discussed at a meeting. You might have something you saw that seems incredibly dangerous: we certainly want to talk about THAT. Maybe it isn't so dangerous, maybe it's worse than you thought. I myself have a couple of things I want to show everyone which might be helpful, and a third thing I have a question about that surely someone has an idea about the danger involved. So, for this part of the meeting, if you have something to talk about, bring it along, and let Bill Bell know so he can compile a list of those who will be sharing. I think we ALL can learn something cool from each other. A couple of years ago, when I wasn't quite so very old, but VERY JADED nonetheless, at this meeting I learned that someone; Jeff Gilbert, I think; was putting magnets on pencils to keep them handy around his lathe. I still use that tip today. I even have magnetic bars all over my shop now. This session can be extremely useful for any and all of us.

BTW: January we will have a delayed meeting to accommodate the schedule of our demonstrator, The Tiny Turner, Emma Cook. That meeting will occur on January 22,

2026 in person at the Woodworkers' Club. We are moving the meeting for her, as she is also going to demonstrate at MidMaryland Woodturning Club and Catoctin Area Turners, during the time period, both of which you are encouraged to attend if you want to see more of her techniques. I understand that she is doing a series of demos online on YouTube heading into Christmas. I saw her at the AAW meeting last June, and found it to be quite good. Again, the January meeting will be on the 22<sup>nd</sup>. More to come in the following weeks...

## **MONTGOMERY COUNTY (MD) WOODTURNERS November**

### **2025 MEETING MINUTES**

The November 6, 2025 meeting of the Montgomery County Woodturners (MCW) was called to order at 6:37 pm by president Joe Barnard. Present were members and one newish turner, Jim Spies.

President Barnard announced that as of today the meeting room at Woodcraft, where the MCW regularly meets, was free and would be so in the future. This was significant for MCW as the room “rental” has been the club’s “major expense.” He was uncertain why this change was made, but thought, in part, it was because of our members’ support of Woodcraft’s recent Octoberfest. Barnard thanked the members for their support of this annual event. He did say, however, that the club will need two or three volunteers each meeting to help set up and clean up the meeting space before and after each monthly meeting. Anyone willing to help should see Joe for details.

Joe reminded members that tomorrow (Friday) another **Warriors in Transition** would take place at Woodcraft and following that, there would be another Skills Enhancement Workshop (SEW). Duane, Eliot and Gary will be present to help. As usual be sure to let Duane know if you plan to attend and remember to bring your own tools and wood.

The annual **Turn for the Troops** event in which the public comes to craft pens for those serving in the Armed Forces, will take place on Saturday and Sunday. Roman Steichen oversees that event and asked for volunteers to assist.

The **Montgomery County Lumber Sale** starts soon. Available wood is primarily kiln dried though some is air dried. All types of wood and of various dimensions are available. According to one member who attended last year, prices are “really good”. This wood comes from trees cut down in Montgomery County. One member reported it is a very

popular event and at last year's sale he arrived an hour and was #40 in line.

Joe reminded members that the **December meeting** is a very important meeting. First it is time for MCW's annual elections. Any club member is qualified to run. Second it is our annual potluck meeting. So bring your favorite dish along with disposable plates, napkins, etc. And finally, it is our annual Tools, Tricks and Tips meeting. So come with your best tricks to demonstrate for the members.

And finally, our **January meeting which will be held on January 22**, will feature the British wood turner and carver, Emma Cook, known professionally as The Tiny Turner. She has 20 years of turning and 10 years of carving experience to share with us. No news yet on whether she will also take part in a class.

Tonight, the Show, Tell and Ask session had 12 members demonstrate their work. A reminder for those participating is STA, please remember to state your name, to speak into the Mic and make certain the mic is directly in front of you.

It's time to pay your MCW dues. Please pay on line or directly to our Treasurer, Tim.

The meeting was adjourned at 7:30 pm.



## Back to Basics II – (Gary Guenther)

*One of MCW's prime directives is education. We have inexperienced turners who can use some guidance, and even experienced turners can benefit from an occasional refresher.*

### “Turn a Wood Bowl” series by Kent Weakley

Kent Weakley is a woodturner who had created a large collection of video tutorials on his YouTube channel, “Turn a Wood Bowl”. His videos, courses, and website provide extensive instruction for turning a wood bowl. If you are new to woodturning, an effective way to learn is by combining Kent’s free You Tube videos with his website content. His channel is organized into playlists that cover specific topics, which can help guide you through the process. You can do it on your own, but here I’ll do the organizational work and give them to you a few at a time each month.
